STRATFORD'S PLANS FOR NEW STATION
Council and Board of Trade Unite To Submit Proposition.
[Special to The Advertiser.]
Stratford, April 20.—At a joint conference of the members of the council, and of the board of trade, a sub-committee, consisting of Mayor Dingman, Ald. Corrie and Carter, President J. J. Mason, of the board of trade, Messrs. J. R. MacDonald and George McLagan, was appointed to draft out a proposition to be submitted to the G. T. R. relative to the new station. Although the proposition was not admitted to the meeting for discussion at Stratford, it is understood that there is decided opposition against the closing of Downie street, a tentative agreement in regard to which it is claimed, was never reached by the Legislature.

A large colic dog, belonging to Mr. Arthur Lee, Mowat street, went mad yesterday afternoon. Early in the morning, when Mr. Lee was removing the dog from the yard, the animal, which was a large pointer, became excited and made a rapid exit from the house, Mr. Lee being unable to stop it. It passed over to Stratford street, where, in the afternoon, it ran under a dwelling owned by Mr. John Lagimodiere. The dog was kept a prisoner under the dwelling until the arrival of Constable O'Donald, when it was destroyed.

A meeting of the board of trade will be held in the city hall on Friday evening to discuss the new park scheme. The temporary roof erected over the fountain will be removed, and the large fountains, which contain amounts of water, are now being run off.

NIAGARA POWER DELAY BOTHERS ST. MARYS
Bylaw Guaranteeing Bonds of Cement Company To Be Resubmitted to Voters.

St. Marys, April 20.—A special meeting of the town council was held Wednesday evening to consider the matter of resubmitting the guaranteeing of the \$40,000 bonds to the cement company, which was carried last year by a large majority. Mr. L. Harston, solicitor for the company, in addressing the council, said that owing to the delay in securing Niagara power, the proposed company was placed in a very serious position of not knowing whether they would have the promised Niagara power or have to charter the power of the machinery to suit steam power, which made the bylaw voted on last year of practically no use to them. Although the council has the power to extend the time for the operations of the bylaw, the company did not wish them to assume that responsibility, which would give room for cavilling by opponents of the bylaw; but they ask the council to resubmit it to the people and have their approval by another vote. Some changes, he said, are to be made in the new bylaw, such as to extend the time of payment to ten years, instead of five, and while no provision was made in the old bylaw, the company would have a sinking fund by installments laid past after the third year of passing the bylaw. The capital in the new company will not be less than \$250,000.

Dr. Thomas J. McCallough, of Toronto, one of the large stockholders of the proposed cement company, said one of the principal delays to the starting of the company last year was the uncertainty then of Niagara power for their plant, which was promised for the 1st of March, then the 1st of May, and is now probably the 1st of June. It was a serious matter to go on with the plant under the old bylaw. Then, if the lines are finished for the Niagara power, they would be able to start the company by the Government for three or four months, which would be a most serious matter financially for the company, as probably \$350,000 would be needed, and the interest on such a large amount through delay of power would be a heavy loss. The parties forming the company are asking for a new charter and the Government while the new bylaw extends the time to September, 1911, to have the plant running. They expect, he said, to be running in the spring of 1911, and be prepared to accept contracts for delivery of cement.

On motion of Councillors Meighen and Graham it was voted that bylaw No. 185, to guarantee the bonds of St. Marys, to guarantee the bonds of an incorporated company to be formed by G. Lynd, of Owen Sound, and Dr. J. T. McCallough, of Toronto, to the extent of \$40,000, for the purpose of erecting a factory building, plant and machinery in the town of St. Marys, to carry on the business of manufacturing Portland cement, be resubmitted to the ratepayers.

The bylaw was read three times and passed. The voting will take place on May 29.

THREE FISHERMEN LOST.
Charlottetown, P. E. I., April 20.—Three fishermen—Peter Strachan, 21, Edward Holland, 18, and Lazarus Campbell, 30, of Priest Point, on the north side of the island, left yesterday in a gasoline dory to tend their nets, and it is feared they have been lost. The wind blew strong from shore and it is thought the dory could not live in it. It is reported one man was seen working on the shore about a mile out. A boat went out in search of them, but returned and reported failure. The Government steamer Brant left today to search. There were no provisions or water in the dory.

Will Be in Charge of Tuberculosis Patients at Victoria Hospital.

At the meeting of the hospital trust held yesterday afternoon Dr. E. A. McCullough, physician at the sanatorium, was named tuberculosis specialist at Victoria Hospital. He will be in charge of the patients in the tuberculosis ward there, and will also be in charge of the outside patients. The position is without remuneration.
Superintendent Heard's report for the month of March showed that during the month 194 patients had been admitted, 54 males, 103 females and 37 children. During the same period there had been 226 discharged, 75 males, 96 females and 55 children. There were 16 births, 12 deaths and 66 operations. There were 183 patients taking treatment on March 31. The receipts during the month were \$2,489.40.
Hon. Adam and Mrs. Beck donated six chairs for the tuberculosis ward of the sanatorium, and the gift was suitably acknowledged.

MR. W. T. EDGE WAS INJURED BY A FALL

AERIAL MANOEUVRES.
Berlin, April 21.—The first imperial review of airships belonging to the army will take place today. The Emperor ordered the three aerial cruisers which recently engaged in manoeuvres at Cologne, to proceed in squadron formation to Hamburg, where his majesty will hold a review.
The airships are Zeppelin II, Parseval II, and Gross I, constructed on different systems. They will leave Cologne before daybreak. A large detachment of the balloon battalion has been ordered to that place to assist in the landing.
