ROOSEVELT A CAESAR; THEOSOPHISTS SAY SO

Great Roman and Alexander
Live Anew in the Dash-
ing American.

Chicago, Sept. 15.—A great astral giant, a master of men in every period in which he reappears upon the earth, a being that had his inception before in Alexander the Great of Macedonia, and later, probably, in Julius Caesar, Napoleon Bonaparte, George Washington and Abraham Lincoln, is the soul picture of Theodore Roosevelt as drawn by the Theosophical Society during the convention held yesterday at the assembly hall in Northwestern University, Lake and Dearborn streets. A special comparison was made of Col. Roosevelt and Julius Caesar.

T. H. Talbot, chairman of the delegate assembly, declared that he had no doubt that the spirit of Theodore Roosevelt had achieved prominence in the world's affairs in previous generations. His present status is even greater, he said, than in past ages, for it has grown with the experience of each physical life.

Is Like Alexander.
"Our occultist," said Mr. Talbot, "have a genealogy, or rather a list of all the great personages, each with his or her own name, for all physical reappearances. I do not have at hand the astral name for Theodore Roosevelt, but he is one of the greatest that ever appeared on the earth. He very probably once lived in the person of Alexander the Great or Julius Caesar. A study of his character shows that he has developed his greatness only through many ages of training."

"He is a great statesman, and doubtless, if the occasion demanded, he would show himself a military genius, as did Julius Caesar or Alexander the Great. He is as generous as were those two men. He is so big that he sees a wider benefit in being sincere and honest in his efforts to influence people than it would be to use his insight and intellectual power to hoard private, personal gain."

"After Julius Caesar had been outlawed by Pompey and decided to cross the Rubicon he found the people of Rome ready to receive him as a chief prepared to deliver them from the corruption and political rottenness with which the Government had been infested preceding him."

Roosevelt a Caesar.
"He turned for the corrupt politicians and gave the people of Rome the best Government they had ever known. Roosevelt is doing the same thing. He has swept through the foreign countries and conquered them, and now he has come home, and the plotting, iniquitous enemies who have made our government a national scandal are being scourged and driven out. Is not the genius the same, only improved. For in this modern age we do not have to bear with bloodshed."

Mr. Talbot asserted the reappearance of the spirit of Julius Caesar in great men of succeeding ages. Of course, there were differences, he explained, such as would be expected in the different physical developments of the succeeding bodies. He said there were existing in the present age men who had become great through ages of religious study.

Weiler Van Hook, who last Sunday was re-elected general secretary of the society, lectured on "Humanity and Divinity." There will be continuing sessions this morning, and this afternoon the society will take a lake trip. C. Jinarajadasa, the personal representative of Mrs. Besant, will read "Some of the lives from class A" this afternoon, beginning at 1:15 o'clock, and continuing until 3:15, when the party will leave for a boat trip.

MADAME CAVALIERI IS GETTING UNEASY

Lawyers Disclose Many Technicalities That May Save
Chanler's Millions.

New York Sept. 15.—Because the famous and mysterious marriage pact between Robt. Winthrop Chanler and Mme. Lina Cavallieri-Chanler which has stirred inter-continental society to gossiping, was not signed by Chanler's first wife and because it is said to compromise the trust fund of \$250,000 belonging to Chanler's two children by his former marriage and the alimony fund for Mrs. Chanler the first, it was reported here today that the pre-nuptial agreement will be proved null and void.

She Is Worried Now.
In an interview granted by Mme. Cavallieri-Chanler in her Avenue de Nesle residence in Paris, the operative bride showed today that she is worried over the outcome of her brother's efforts in New York to bring about a fulfillment of the contract at the earliest possible date.

Cavallieri said she had been unwittingly duped by her husband because she thought his fortune at least \$2,000,000 when he married her, judging from the debts which he confessed to.

It was learned in Paris that the love messages from "Bob," the husband, had suddenly ceased five days ago, the last one being the cable-gram in which Chanler sent affection and hope for the money. There were notable features about the Cavallieri interview. Asked if she still loved her husband she replied with a shrug, "Ah, I esteem Mr. Chanler very highly for his talent. I may go to America within six weeks to join him there. My presence may be needed in America for our affairs are entirely straightened out, likely."

ATTEMPT TO FIRE SCHOOL

Matron Finds Firebug at Work, And
Is Brutally Attacked.

Andover, N. H., Sept. 15.—An attempt to burn the girls' dormitory at Proctor Academy here last night was frustrated before a blaze had been started. Mrs. Eugene Sawyer, the matron, is in danger of death today from a blow delivered by the incendiary in making his escape.

Mrs. Sawyer, on going to the basement suddenly at 8 o'clock, discovered a strange man in the act of applying a match to a pile of wood. She screamed and the man fled. She followed him to the basement and extinguished the blaze. The man had escaped. Mrs. Sawyer was set upon and beaten by men alleged to be doctors say today that her condition is grave.

The academy authorities can find no motive for the attempt to set fire to the dormitory. The building accommodates about fifteen students. A wide search for the firebug is being made by the police of this section of the state today, but they have only a meagre description of him.

MISS WALKER'S ESTATE.

Toronto, Sept. 15.—The will of the late Miss Annie Gooderham Walker, of Toronto, filed for probate in the surrogate court today, disposes of an estate of \$16,833. The bulk of the estate goes to the three sisters and a brother, and the residue to several nieces, nephews and cousins.

James Kennedy, of Toronto, has been authorized to administer the estate valued at \$17,317, almost entirely of cash in the bank, of his brother Alexander Kennedy, who died intestate in Toronto, Aug. 29. The only heirs are the three brothers, James, of Toronto; Duncan, of Portland, Me.; and William, Superior, Wis.

BEGGAR ON \$20 A WEEK

Cripple "Lives Like a Fighting Cock"
Out of West End Charity.

London, Sept. 15.—For a considerable time past a gray-haired man, with gray beard and a red face, has been wheeled in an old bath-chair by a lad to a corner of Lower Regent street, and there he sat whilst a dog in fancy costume came up with a tin can and begged for him. He is a cripple in both legs and one arm.

He was carried by two constables into Marlborough street police court on Monday to answer a charge of street begging. He gave the name Matthew Moulding, and his address as Pascal street, Wandsworth road.

The police said that after many warnings, of which Moulding took no notice whatever, he was arrested. He was sitting in his perambulator, with the dog dressed up, with a tin can and a notice asking the public to "give the dog a penny." A boy who had been wheeling the man about said the begger paid him 3d a day, and on Saturday Moulding had eight pence of beer, some gin and pepper, whisky, and two pennyworth of cheese. He had 18s 6d in his pockets. He made 12s to 14s a day.

Moulding told the magistrate he had been in this condition for thirty-five years. It took him six months to train the dog, and said he was the first time the police had interfered with him.

Mr. Denman said no doubt the beggar was "living like a fighting cock," and spending a good deal on luxuries. He could not see how this nuisance of a professional beggar was to be stopped if people would give in to the streets. There were plenty of appliances and provision for persons like this. By way of warning he would be dealt with in the somewhat unusual way in such a case by being fined 20s.

ASSAULTERS ARRAIGNED.

New York, Sept. 14.—John Meyers, Robert Cochrane, Henry Moran and Michael Kane, who were arrested in West street last night, charged with assault upon a sailor who was assaulted in Buffalo and his right ear severed and sent in a bottle to President Couby, of the Pittsburgh Steamship Company, were today arraigned in police court. Kane was discharged, but the others were held in \$3,000 bail for examination tomorrow.

The assault is alleged to have grown out of a strike of men employed by Great Lakes transportation companies. Edward Fraser, the victim, was a non-union man working on a vessel that arrived at Buffalo on June 26. Fraser was set upon and beaten by men alleged to have been strikers. A threatening letter was sent to Mr. Couby with Fraser's ear. Through the letter the post-office department followed the trail to New York, and last night's arrest resulted.
