Dr. W. R. Bruce-Smith, provincial inspector of prisons, is in the city today, and will pay a visit of inspection to the London Hospital for the Insane. In conversation with The Advertiser, Dr. Bruce-Smith stated that there was no particular object in his visit it being particular object in his visit, it being erely routine inspection. He evinced much satisfaction when informed that the proposal to establi h a prison farm in Middlesex was arousing interest locally.

An Undeveloped Tract.
"The thing has gone beyond the experimental stage," he said. "It has proved a big success in other places, and think it should in Middlesex. The thing think it should in Middlesex. The thing is to get a large tract of land which will require development, such as clearing and draining, the object being to provide pienty of useful outdoor labor for the prisoners. At present the prisoners in our county jails waste a good deal of their time. Of course, care must be taken to see that the land is there—that is, that it is fitted for agricultural purposes, so that the labor of the prisoners will not be in vain."
