SUIT MAY STOP ERECTION
OF CHICAGO FEDERAL PARK

Property-Owner Near Park Has Issued Injunction to Restrict Building of Stands.

Chicago, March 13.—A suit to prevent the erection of the Chicago Federal League plant was brought in the Cook County Circuit Court today by Herman Croon, owner of property near the site of the proposed park. The plaintiff asserted in his bill that Charles Weeghman, William N. Walker and James A. Gilmore, incorporators of the club, had failed to file with the building commissioner the written consent of a majority of the property owners on the streets surrounding the park. An injunction restraining the defendants from building grandstands and from advertising their intention to hold exhibitions of baseball was asked.

The concrete foundations of the grandstand and bleachers are about completed, work having been in progress on the plant for over a week.

NO RUNNING RACES
FOR LONDON THIS YEAR

Canadian Stewards Do Not Include This City in Dates.

HOPE FOR RACES NEXT YEAR

It Is Not Likely Track Will Be Completed Until 1915—List of Dates Announced.

That there is little likelihood of local followers of the racing game attending a meet this year on the mile track that is being constructed east of the city limits is proven by the fact that the Canadian racing stewards have sanctioned this year's dates and have failed to include the Forest City in their list.

"You can take it from me that there is little chance of us having anything but the merry-go-round at Queen's Park and our old Josh Billings with his even money book until 1915, when there may be something doing in the bangtail game here," stated a man who is closely connected with all that has to do in the line of the sport.

LIST OF ELIGIBLES FOR
KENTUCKY FUTURITIES

Association Will Distribute Sum of \$25,000 Among the Four Events.

Lexington, Ky., March 13.—The list of eligibles for the Kentucky Futurities to be trotted here at the fall meetings of the Kentucky Trotting Horse Breeders' Association in 1914 and 1915, were announced today, and enabled the association to distribute \$25,000 among the four events. It is divided as follows: Five thousand dollars for 2-year-old trotters at the meeting of 1914; \$2,000 for 2-year-olds at the meeting of 1915; \$14,000 for 3-year-old trotters at the meeting of 1915, and \$5,000 for 4-year-old trotters at the meeting of 1915. A gold cup will go to the winner of the 4-year-old event.

STRATFORD ENTERS
HYDRO-RADIAL UNION

The Surrounding Municipalities Join in Support of the Movement.

Stratford, March 13.—Stratford, with the unanimous support of 130 delegates from the surrounding municipalities and city hall full of representative local citizens, entered the hydro-radial game tonight by becoming a member of the Hydro-Radial Union of Western Ontario. The platform was crowded with natives from the municipalities surrounding and with prominent men.

Elected as officers were: Monitory president, Hon. Adam Beck; president, W. J. Mooney; first vice-president, Mayor John Stevenson; second vice-president, C. McLeod; secretary, D. A. McLachlan; treasurer, R. Mussen; committee, John Whyte, A. McDonald and D. M. Wright.

Resolutions were passed favoring the purpose of the union to disseminate useful knowledge on hydro-radials and to carry on a campaign when once the estimates from the commissioners' engineers are received, and to support strongly the big delegation which will wait upon the Federal Government on March 26.

Mayor J. Stevenson presided over the meeting and Hon. Adam Beck, H. B. Morphy, K. C. M. P., James Tormey, M. P., P. T. J. Hannigan, J. W. Lyon and Mayor Samuel Carter, all three of Guelph, were there to explain the radial situation.

CARNEGIE FUND HELPED
REPEAL OF EXEMPTIONS

Senate Committee Hears of \$30,000 Spent in Literature.

Washington, March 13.—How the Carnegie endowment for international peace has aided in the fight for repeal of the tolls exemption clause of the Panama Canal act was revealed today by the Senate lobby committee.

Senator James Brown Scott, secretary, and a member of the board of directors of the endowment, appearing under subpoena with books and papers, told the committee that a total of more than \$30,000 had been appropriated for "circulation of Panama Canal literature."

Detailing the efforts of the endowment, Dr. Scott said a million copies of a pamphlet urging repeal of the exemption clause, and signed by practically the entire directorate, had been sent throughout the country and 700,000 copies of Senator Root's speech in the Senate, urging repeal, had been mailed under the senator's frank.

Money For Peace Propaganda.

The annual statement of the endowment showed that the American Peace Society, of which Senator Burton, of Ohio, is president, draws a subvention of \$21,000 a year from the Carnegie organization. This money was used, Mr. Scott said, to distribute pamphlets bearing on peace propaganda subjects. The committee displayed great interest in these publications as dealt with Panama Canal tolls or general arbitration treaties. Dr. Scott agreed to furnish copies of all such documents.

No questions were asked the various witnesses relating to charges made in an executive session of the Senate recently by Senator O'Gorman that the actual purpose of the endowment was to promote an alliance between Great Britain and the United States, its peace propaganda serving merely as a cloak for that purpose.

Peace and Tolls.

Senator Reed, however, demanded an explanation of the relation between international peace and the tolls for use of

That light, high-grade steel castings were mostly imported from the United States. That manganese and other alloy steel castings were imported from the United States and Great Britain.

That bar steel for rifles and rock drills, etc., has to be imported. That ingots for forgings and ingots for tool-steel manufacturers are not made in Canada. Such ingots enter the United States duty free.

And that all steel castings are subject to a duty of 27½% ad valorem.

CAPITAL EXPENDITURE.

Our plant in Welland will be ready for operation about May 1st, 1914, and will have a capacity of 4,000 tons of steel castings per annum. The total cost of this first plant, including organization, site, foundry equipment, electrical furnace, all buildings, labor and engineer's charges, will be under \$130,000 by contracts already made by the company. 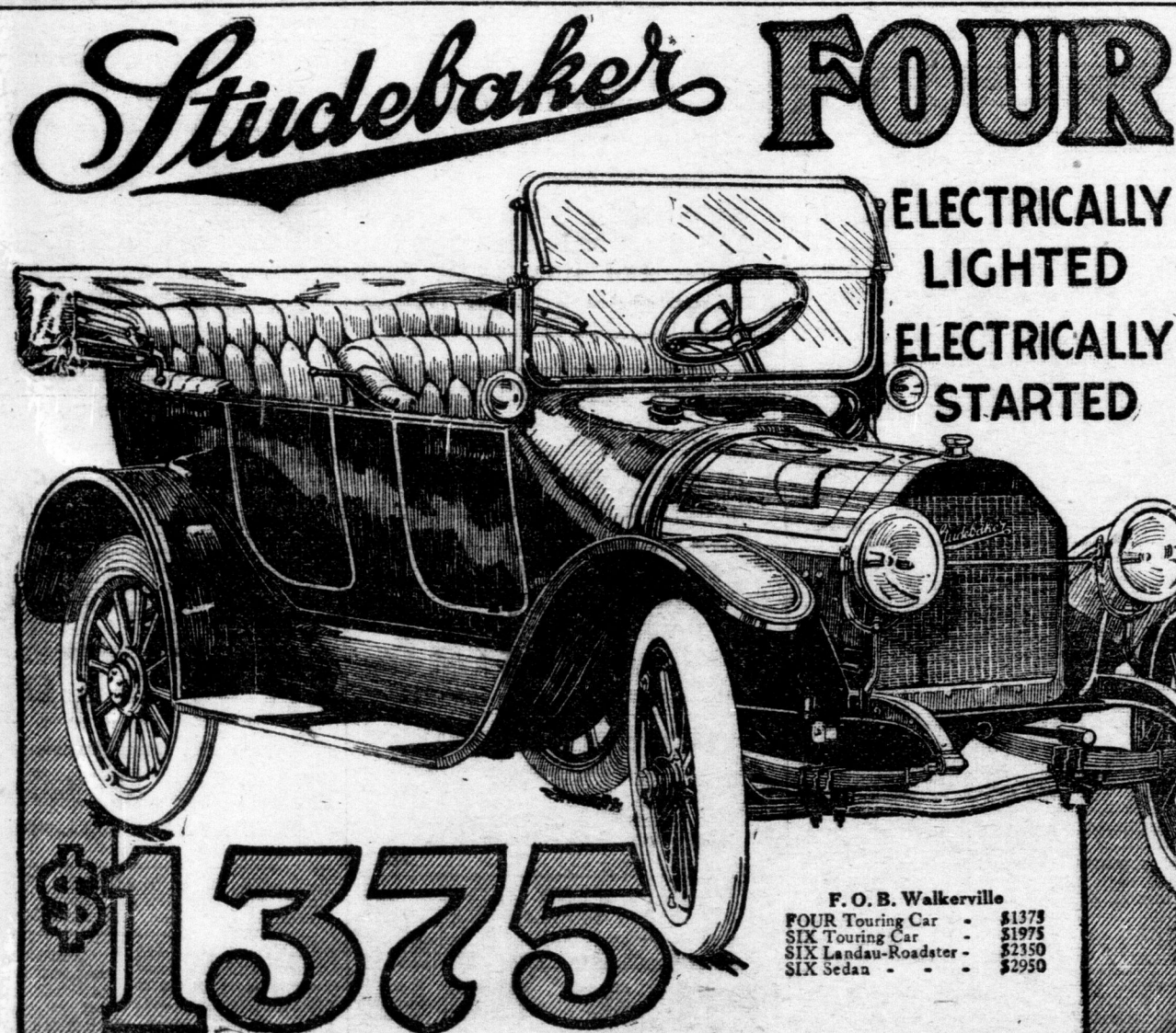
