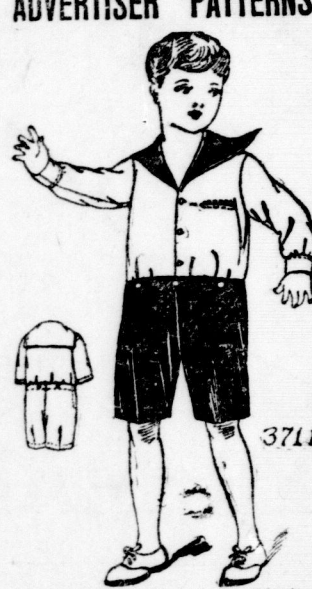
PLAN VALENTINE DANCE.

LEADS INTO CITY OF HEART'S DESIRE

C. G. I. T. Paves Way For Ideal Canadian Womanhood.

The story of Shapur, the vendor of salt, of his sojourn in the Desert of Waiting on the way to the City of Heart's Desire, was the fitting parable which capped and brought home the lesson of the inspiring address delivered by Miss Lillian Oliver of Toronto on the Canadian Girls in Training program at a rally of girls' groups and young women's classes, held in King Street Presbyterian Church Wednesday evening, under the auspices of the London Presbyterian Women's Missionary Society.

Following the close of the annual meeting of the W. M. S. in the afternoon, a rally banquet for Presbyterian girls and young women was held in the basement of the King street church, with Miss Oliver as guest of honor. A tempting supper was served by the C. G. I. T. group of the church, after which adjournment was made to the church auditorium. A number of young women and girls of other denominations were also present to hear Miss Oliver, who is secretary of girls' work in Bloor Street Presbyterian Church, Toronto.

"Shapur, the vendor of salt, started out to find the City of Heart's Desire," said the speaker. "On the way, in the Desert of Waiting, he lost most of his salt. Finally a bee led him to Omar the alchemist, where, after long service, he gave his salt for a long of attar of roses, which admitted him to the City of Heart's Desire." The C. G. I. T. period of a girl's life was likened to the years in the Desert of Waiting, to prepare for the goal which should be the ambition of every girl, the "City of Heart's Desire," an all-round, well-developed, Christian Canadian womanhood.

"The C. G. I. T. program," continued Miss Oliver, has been worked out all over the Dominion, and we are today convinced that it is the ideal thing for the 'teen-age girl, providing for her four-fold development, physical, intellectual, spiritual and social.

Strong in Body, Mind, Spirit.

"Every race has its own ideal of womanhood. It is hardly true to say that we in Canada have a national ideal of womanhood, but those who have thought most deeply have come to believe that only the woman who seeks to keep her body as the Temple of God, whose mind is growing in the love of truth, whose will is trained to right choices, whose heart is set to love God and her neighbor, is approaching the ideal life. This is the ideal of the four-fold life, the life at its best physically, intellectually, spiritually and socially.

"Surely God has given to each of us priceless gifts of body, mind and spirit that we may keep strong, pure; that we may use our minds to understand the truth; and that we may see the beauty of His world. Surely He intended us to a world of other people that we may come to know people that we may love, and have a joy in feeling ourselves a part in the race, and of taking our part in the life.

"The more we think of this ideal the truer it seems. The oftener we present it to a group of girls the more convinced we become that it is indeed God's ideal for them.

Cherish Health.

"Vigorous health is the right of every girl, is the urgent need when life is to reach its highest power. It is appalling the number who, through carelessness or ignorance, are wasting physical resources. 'Cherish health' is a slogan that needs to be burnt into the consciousness of Canada's girlhood."

A vision of life, the speaker declared, should include a program of health-giving activities. In this connection she touched upon the co-operative games, etc., which are a feature of the C. G. I. T. course.

With regard to the intellectual development afforded, "a narrow horizon," she said, "is the curse of many women. Concerning spiritual development, surely the simplest and most beautiful way in which a girl can know God is by coming to him as she would to friends and talking to him in prayer."

With regard to the working out of the program, "It is a Sunday school program for Sunday school classes and groups," she emphasized. A lucid explanation was also given of the relationship between the C. G. I. T. and the Women's Missionary Society. "It is affiliated with the W. M. S.," stated Miss Oliver, "and one meeting a month is devoted to a mission study program, when an offering is taken for the W. M. S., the only offering that is taken by the Canadian Girls in Training."

Mrs. W. R. McIntosh, wife of the minister of King street church, and Mrs. J. P. Faulkner, Young Women's Auxiliary secretary for the Presbyterian, were in charge of arrangements for the rally. Singing was led by a choir of Canadian Girls in Training.
