OUTLINES REMEDY FOR LABOR SLUMP

Sir William Hicks Declares Britain Must Develop Inter-Empire Trade.

ADVISES EMIGRATION

Believes Dominions Mother Country Would Both Profit.

London, Dec. 21.-(Canadian Press Cable.)-Sir William Joynson Hicks, secretary for overseas trade, was the guest of the Overseas Institute at luncheon today. Addressing the gathering, he emphasized that the sole remedy for present unemployment in Great Britain was the development of inter-empire trade.

Sir William cited figures showing that all the dominions imported less from Great Britain and more from the United States in the last year for which records were available. Referring to Canada, he said he did not blame her. She was entitled to

buy in the most suitable market. Sir William also cited figures showing that Canada in 1911 took, per head of population, \$16 worth of goods from Great Britain and \$46 from the United States, while the 1922 figures were, respectively, \$13 and \$59.

The overseas trade minister said the development of their own indus-

tries by the dominions was not reason ther than do good for the prosperity of Great Britain. Urges Emigration.

There was, said the speaker, strong demand in the dominions hav-ing nascent industries for protection against the whole world, including

face this fact. He could only ask in the forthcoming economic conference for suggestions for the improvement of inter-imperial trade in the full realization that there will be no suggestion of any kind by the imperial epresentatives that the dominions should in any wise give up the industries they have started.

Sir William emphasized the need of emigration both from the viewpoint of Great Britain and the dominions. He said Great Britain recognized that emigrants must be of the best type. He expressed the opinion, amid wild cheers, that instead of paying out Kingston, Dec. 20 .- The wreck of He expressed the opinion, amid wild cheers, that instead of paying out one hundred millions in unemployment doles it would have been better to devote fifty millions to a great cheme of state-aided emigration in placing men in a position to be come desirable citizens of the dominions. 
