from the Imperial Bank of Canada. In addition, Hearst claims \$500 and Clarke \$637.50 as wages. Costs of the action are also claimed.

According to the statement of claim, Hearst Mason and Clarke were managers of local branches of the Home bank, which failed in August 1923, while Hart was chief accountant at a downtown branch.
