

CHILDREN PERISH AS HOME BURNS

Winnipeg Woman in Serious Condition After Early Morning Blaze.

Winnipeg, Aug. 28.—Two children, Harry, 7, and Julia, 5, were asphyxiated when the home of their parents, Mr. and Mrs. M. Kojlyck was completely destroyed by fire which started early this morning. The mother is in a serious condition from shock and suffocation and is resting at the residence of a neighbor, and a niece, Phyllis Stadyk, aged 14, is in the general hospital suffering from cuts from the fire. The mother was apparently when she tried to escape from the burning house through a window.

At the time of the fire the mother and the three children were alone in the house. They were awakened from their sleep by the cries of neighbors and the sound of the fire alarm. The mother tried to escape through the window but when she tried to open the door she found it was already broken through the roof and the damage had been done.

WORKMEN ARE HURT AS PLATFORM FALLS

Eight Employees in Stratford Factory Have Narrow Escape.

Stratford, Aug. 27.—Eight employees of the McLagan Furniture Company had a miraculous escape from death here today, when a platform, carrying about three tons of machinery fell about 15 feet to a concrete floor. Five of the men were on the platform and three underneath hoisting some heavy coils into place to be connected with a huge suction fan, already installed on the platform. All suffered minor injuries, the worst being a broken arm.

W. HANNA APPOINTED TO ST. MARYS FORCE

Mill Nearly Ready.
The work of overhauling and repairing the plant of the old St. Marys Milling Company, now owned by the Wolverton Milling Company, is practically completed, and it is expected that the mill will be in operation by September 1. Deliveries of wheat this year have been very good. Standard wheat is being purchased at \$1.32 per bushel, f.o.b. the mill, with one cent per pound extra for each pound over standard. When operations commence the mill will have a capacity of 700 barrels per day, and already a large number of orders are on hand.
