THE King of Prussia opened the new military port of Jahde, henceforth to be called Wilhelmshaven, on the 19th June. The port is a huge artificial construction of granite, comprises five harbors or basins 26 feet deep, from 1200 to 600 feet long, and from 750 to 350 feet wide, three dry docks, and all the establishments necessary for the res pairs of a considerable fleet. The whole has cost £1,500,000. 
