So that the question is simply this, have they the right to compel me to give up my children, without giving me in return a guarantee that my children will be treated just as well as I would treat them myself, and that they would have the same comforts as at home? It would not be justice to ask me to pay for a private ward in order to secure such comforts. Then again I would want my own physician and not any physician that the hospital authorities should feel disposed to place in attendance on my children. Neither would I want about fifty students a day placing the handle of a spoon in my children's mouths to see how the disease might be acting. This is a question that ought to be taken up by the Trades and Labor Council, because if the Mayor and Hospital authorites have their way the best interests of the workingman will be greatly interfered with. This Isolation Hospital ought to be con lucted on the mest generous principles, and there ought not to be the usual cry of economy used in the discussion of this question, If I should send my child to the Hospital to be treated for a disease in order to save expense I should not expect anything but pauper fare, but if that child is forced from me against my will, then I have the right to demand the very best of treatment for that child. I am of the opinion that this isolation hospital question would be settled more in the interests of the general public on the lines laid down by Dr. Bryce and our Medical Health Officer, Dr. Allen.
