"CHARLES NAPIER.

Dr. Cheyne, was a celebrated English physician, who flourished more than a century ago. In the early part of his life he was vo-luptuary; and before he attained to middle ige, he was so corpolent that it was necessary o open the whole side of his carriage that he night enter; and he saw death to be inevitable, without a change of his course. He im-mediately abandoned all ardent spirit, wine, and fermented liquors, and confined himself wholly to vegetables, milk, and water. This course, with active exercise, reduced him from the enormus weight of 448 pounds, to 140; and restored his health and the vigour of his mind. After a few years he ventured to change his abstentious dist, for one more rich and stunulating. But the effect was a recurrence of his former corpulance and ill-health. A return to milk, water and veg stables, testored aim again; and he committed in uninterrupted health to the age of 72. His numerous works are full of most carnest exportations to
