SOME HISTORICAL ANYQUIES.

Two generations of the Chipman family have so far been noticed.

Mr. H. Handley Chipman, son of John, junior, and grandson of John senior, who was a native of Dorsetshire, was born on the 31st of August, 1717.

Woolen Mills Burned.—Word has come from Lockport, that Wm. McCall's woolen mill was totally destroyed by fire which began about 3 o'clock this morning. The mill was one of the finest in the State. The cause of the fire was not ascertained. The origin of the fire is unknown.—Gazette.

The drowning accident at Sackville.—Sackville, N. B., Dec. 4th.—A deep gloom rests upon the college and community here since the fatal accident which occurred yesterday afternoon. A party of students had gone up to Morrie's pond, a distance of three or four miles, to enjoy an afternoon's skating. Frank Hamilton and his cousin, E. P. Carey, had crossed the pond in the afternoon, and were skating in the water and his cries attracted the attention of the students further down the pond. They rescued the bodies of Mr. B. B. Higgins and C. H. Rice, the drowning man was rescued, after having been in the water for nearly twenty minutes. It was not till Carey had been taken from his perilous position that any one knew of poor Hamilton's misfortune. As Carey reached the shore, he was told that "Dip" had got Frank out." He then pointed to the hole where his unfortunate companion had gone down, but it was too late; only the open water was to be seen. The rescue was a work of great difficulty and danger since the ice for some distance was exceedingly thin. As the boys were approaching, the ice broke up, and the boys were, apparently, very much frightened.

Deaths in an instant.—Another death was caused last night by contact with an electric light wire. Henry Harris, aged thirty-six years, of 355½ Forty-fifth street, was killed shortly before midnight in front of the dry goods establishment of Bernard Callan, at 675½ Eglar avenue, where he was employed as a clerk.

Harris and Lawrence Hughes, another employee, were carrying a large bundle of wire from the store, saw, preparatory to closing for the night. An electric light wire, which ran into an air light suspended in front of the store, sagged down low, and as the men raised the showcase the metal lining came in contact with a portion of the wire, which was not insulated. Harris' hands clutched the metal bars, so that, as the contact was made, the deadly current flashed along the metal through his body, back to the metal, and to the wire again.

He uttered a cry and fell to the pavement in a moment. His wife, who was with him, ran to his side, and called out to a physician who was quickly summoned. He said that death had been instantaneous. New York Times.
