Why was not such a steamer as the Fruit-ers continued in the bay port apple trade, as well as other fruit steamers that the writer sent to Kingsport and Horton Landing, where this season at least 100,000 barrels of apples could be shipped without any railway carriage? It is estimated that over 60,000 barrels of apples for export are within or-dinary carting distance of Kingsport, where a steamer of 10,000 to 12,000 barrels capacity can asfely load up to the 1st of January, if not all winter. This legitimate, and for the exporter safest, way of shipping the Kings, Hants and An-napolis county autumn apples, was shut off by railway interest and a line of steamers from Halifax actually subsidized by the Dominion government to promote and facili-tate the very traffic they were using the government subsidy te drive off all competi-tion, and exacting from our farmers a rate of freight that for the past twenty years has exceeded that paid by NeW York and Boston exporters from 24c. to 36c. per barrel. If subsidies are granted to develop our fruit export let them be to atseamers of speed, fitted with cold storage, that will load at ports nearest to the region of production, avoiding all unnecessary expense on rail carriage or cartage, so damaging to apples and other fruit, and enable us to compete with our neighbors over the border in this valuable and growing branch of our export traffic with the mother country.
