A HAPPY NEWSPAPER MAN

Middleton's first paper was The Valley Scribe, edited and published over Miller's drug store by Geo. S. ARMISTICE DAY IN BRIDGETOWN

Last Thursday, Armistice Day, passed off very quietly in Bridgetown without any regular celebration. General business in the town as far as we could learn, was not suspended at any time during the day. Less than a dozen people displayed flags, either at their places of business or at their private residences. Dr. M. E. Armstrong, chairman of the School Board, and Rev. E. Underwood, rector of St. James Parish, addressed the school during the morning and the schools were closed during the afternoon. A number of our neighbouring towns held regular celebrations and in most instances business was suspended either all day or during the afternoon, the latter being the most popular arrangement.
