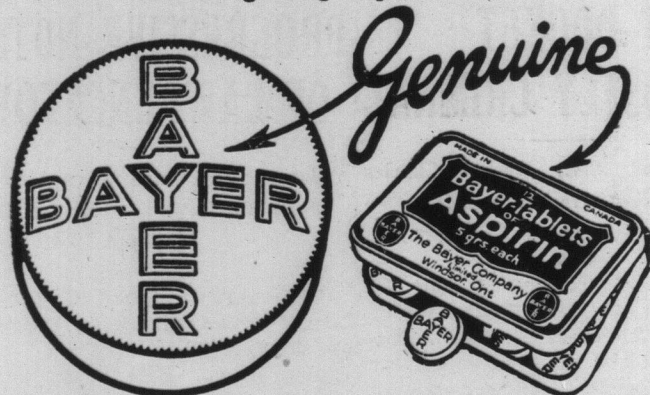

THE NOVA SCOTIA WESTERN BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

The 16th Annual gathering of the Western Baptist Association took place at Nictaux, N. S., June 14th-17th. The first session was held on Thursday evening with the Vice-Moderator, Rev. A. H. Whitman, of Lawrenceton, in the chair. He regretted the absence of the Moderator Rev. D. E. Hatt, who had removed to Toronto, but assured the gathering of Bro. Hatt's prayers for a blessing to rest on the assembly. The addresses were devoted to Social Service. Rev. W. D. Wilson, of Middleton, was the first speaker and took as his subject the Temperance Situation in Nova Scotia. He stated that the majority of the population were biblicists. We should see that the law was more rigidly enforced, and if it was not to ask the reason why. The resolution committee was asked to draw up a resolution asking that the export liquor houses at Halifax be closed.

Rev. A. J. Prosser then delivered an address on Child Welfare. He spoke of the rights granted to women during the past century and described the present as a day of children's rights. Children cannot plead their own cause, they plead to us to do so. A child has the right to be well-born, nourished, clothed and brought up. The choir rendered excellent music during the evening.

Tuesday morning was devoted to the election of officers and committees. The following are the officers for the ensuing year:

- Moderator: Rev. G. W. Brooker, of Freeport.
- Vice-Moderator: Rev. W. D. Wilson, Middleton.
- Clerk: Rev. F. H. Eaton, Bridgewater.
- Asst. Clerk: Rev. W. G. Heister, Lower Granville.
- Treasurer: Mr. C. S. Rogers, Nictaux.

The Digest of Letters compiled and read by Rev. F. H. Eaton, gave the state of the Denomination within the Association. The following is a brief summary for each county.

Digby County—The 14 churches of Digby County report additions to membership as follows: by baptism 34, on experience 4, by letter 12, total 50. Losses to membership, died 29, joined other churches 22, otherwise removed 84, total 132, giving a decrease for the county of 82. This leaves the present membership in Digby Co. Baptist Churches as 2567. This county raised for current expenses \$13,009.

Annapolis County—Additions for the year by baptism 97, on experience 3, by letter 47, total 147. Losses through death 64, joined other churches 68, otherwise removed 149, total 281, giving a decrease of 134. This puts the present membership of the county at 4084. The churches in Annapolis Co. have functioned during the year on \$21,500.

Lunenburg County—Additions to membership by baptism 52, by letter 12, total 64. Losses through death 19, joined other churches 8, otherwise removed 4, total 31. Increase for the year 33, giving a present membership of 1974. Raised for current expense, \$10,829.

Summary for the Association: Of the 55 churches in the Association 9 churches, constituting six pastorates are without pastoral care. There are reported for the year 183 baptisms, not quite half as many as for the preceding year. Additions by letter and otherwise bring the additions up to 261. Losses by death 112, through dismissals by letter 98, otherwise removed 233. Decrease for the year 182. The most of the 233 reported as being lost by other means than the ordinary way are accounted for by 2 or 3 churches reviving their church rolls and "cleaning houses." During the morning a helpful devotional service was conducted by pastor McLeod, of Kingston.

In the afternoon a report on Missions was given by Rev. G. W. Brooker. This report included Grande Ligne, Foreign and Home Missions. After a devotional service conducted by Rev. C. E. Rockingham, the report on Denominational Literature was read by Rev. A. H. Whitman. The "Maritime Baptist," "Tidings" and other literature of the Baptist press were warmly commended.

Premier Taschereau Makes Move to Prevent Fires.

Quebec.—The forests of the Province of Quebec are now closed to the public and orders were given by the forestry department not to issue any more circulation permits or permission to burn slash in the colonization centres. This decision was reached by Premier Taschereau following reports received on the situation and the order will remain in force until such time as the circumstances seem to warrant. No one will be allowed to enter the forest unless employed in fighting fires or on extraordinary reasons warranting such permission to be given.

MARITIME CLUB IDEA SPREADING OVER PROVINCES

Moncton.—The regular meeting of the Maritime Club was well attended. Two letters were read, one from H. A. Grant, Granville Ferry, Annapolis Co., complimenting the club in its efforts. He also called attention to the export of raw materials. The other letter was from W. H. Hogan, Hope River, P.E.I., a prominent farmer, who expressed the hope that the movement may become Maritime-wide.

The following resolution was unanimously adopted: "Whereas, we know there is much meat, butter, eggs, coming into Moncton and cities from the Upper Provinces, and our farmers are suffering from inadequate markets;

"Be it resolved, that we urge our merchants to patronize our home products and only handle, as far as possible, such goods as are produced at home. "We also suggest that this club appoint a committee to call on merchants and get such information as to how much outside products they are handling monthly, and try to ascertain why this is done and our own products a drug on the market."

CATERPILLARS DELAYED TRAIN

Fredericton, N. B.—The Canadian National Railway express from Newcastle, due here at noon by Canadian Eastern division was delayed by hordes of caterpillars which covered the rails for a distance of a mile in the vicinity of Weaver's Station. As a result of the invasion of the army worms the train was forty minutes late in arriving here. Progress through the infested area was said to be slow and greasy. 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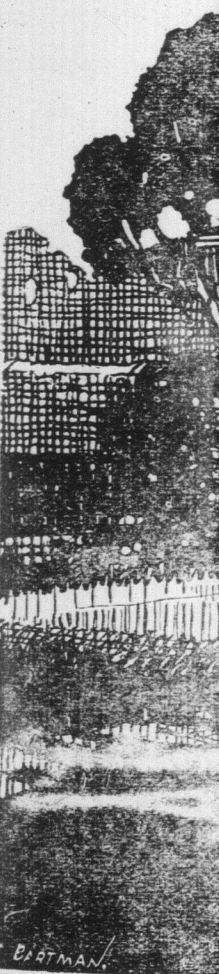
