ELIMINATION OF THE EMBECILE ADVOCATED

Toronto—The elimination of embeccile or mentally abnormal from society, so far as it was possible under organized modern conditions, formed the subject of a lengthy discussion yesterday at the annual convention of the Ontario Health Officers' Association. Several of the members came out boldly with the statement that the reproduction of the mentally abnormal at an alarming rate would have to be or sterilization. Plain speaking was necessary, they said, and the only method by which the evil could be checked, as regarded hereditary mental diseases was in the manner indicated. Only one member, Dr. Lagoste of Tecumseh, entered a protest on the ground that any legislation having in view the end under discussion would be anti-christian and against society.
