## MONEY MARKET.

THERE has been an active demand for money, which still continues. Bankers are less liberal in grant. ing accommodation and paper is more closely criticized. Sterling Exchange in New York is quoted at 108d for Bankers 60 day bills. The price here is $108 \frac{1}{3}$, though round sums could probably be obtained at $108 t$.

GoLd which during the week advanced to 1567 has receded somewhat, closing at $151 \frac{1}{2}$.

Silvir continues in large supply, buying at 43 and melling at $4 \frac{1}{2}$ per cent. discount.

ThHE press of the spring trade being now over the volume of business has materially diminished, and transactions have been more of a local and retail character. Beyond limited shipments to Gulf ports there has been no outward movement in Breadstuffs. Pease and Oats have continued to move, though less actively. Provisions of all kinds have been at a comparative stand, Pork only selling by single barrels, and Butter not at all. Pot Ashes have undergone little change, but Pearls are dull and materially lower. Flovr.-The receipts of the week have been light, and the demand restricted to actual consumptive descriptions, and though no advance of consequence can be noted, tull rates have of what has changed hands. The higher grades are in small suppiy, and the sales of a retail character 8upers from Canada Wheat range from $\$ 6.70$ to 96.90 . with exceptional sales of the more favourite bakers' brands, mostly in brokeu lots, at somewhat more. The bulk of what is arriving is from the Welland Canal, ground from Western Wheat, and though less desirable fur immediate local wants, yet from ita superior keeping $1 \mathbf{r}$ uperties is taken with more confidence at this stage of che season, and a fair amount of business has been done at rates in the vicinity of $\$ 6.75$ to 88.8, No. 2 of really good quality, tuds prompt sale, and even those less desirable from scurcity are taken but at irregular prices. The lower descriptions have also met a fair demand; the sounder lots, free from mixtures of Pease, \&c., being promptly tuken at full previous rates. Those mixed with foreign Grain are regarded with special disfavour, and cannot be moved except as the result of absolute scarcity. Bag Flour nearly balanced. The stronger and sounder samples find most prompt sale, even at relstively high prices owing to the small proportion of really good pifering OATMEAL con inues quiet aud steady; the more quitable samples being taken for export.

GRAIN. - Whe $t$-In the cumparative absence of transactions, praces may be considered nominal,-a few cars of U. C. Spring have sold trom $\$ 140$ to $\$ 1.50$. toward the close at some improvement on late reduced rates. Oats-Less business has been done, but rates continue without material change.

Pork has continued extremely dull during the Whole week, the trausactions being contined to the merest retail. Stocks are light, and there appears no probability of any chaude berore the fall trade sets in. Limited is also very duil, and transastions unusually limited. Arrivals are trifling, and hulders are content 10 await a demand for the little they hold.

Tallow remains unchanged.
BUTIER-The week has been one of uninterrupted dullness; shippers to Britain holdiug off until the market there has settled down to a point ou which be vafe in paying so that no inducemeut in price has been or auy avail to place wholesale parcels. a tew medium lots have been suld at 15 to 16 c ; some holders aro asking higher tigures without finding any enquiry. The late deciluing tendency of the Britlsh maikets for all kinds of Provisions has prevented any speculation; shippers being afraid to venture on any transtions of magnitude at anything over the averge opening prices of previous years, seeing no reason why Butter should be materially higher than in former summer mouths, when Irish and Contiuental Butters, being plentiful and sweeter and tresher than Canadian, monopolised the trade to the almost exclusion of Amcrican, except at low prices.
ABHEs-Pots cuntinue to decline in Britain under the influence of the tinancial pressure, which has materially curtailed the demand. Kecejpts have been unusually limited, and that has prevented prices from furcher depression, shippers having some difticulty in fling existiug orders and engagements of freight. Pearls are arriving more plentilully, and the late excoaroity are no longer obtainable, and the tendency of prices is downwards.
