A meeting of the council of the association was held on Wednesday afternoon, -Col. Gibson presiding. The chief business was the election of officers, regarding ich the chairman expressed the opinion that nominations for the presidency ought t to be confined to gentlemen officially connected with the association or to shooting en. The election of an outsider would connect them to the public more than they ere at present, and might secure for them the sympathy of the public in a desirable ay. Mulock, M.P., and Mr. Geo. Gooderham. Regarding the firstmed gentleman, the association would be unanimous to have him at its head, and ere the colonel ready to accept the position nothing could be more fitting or graceful an to offer him the honor, in view of his long connection and invaluable services to e association, of which he had been secretary for twelve or thirteen years. Lt.-Col. tter, however, had assured him that he did not feel his way clear to accept of the onor, which, in view of the important business that the council would be called upon consider during the year, they would much regret.

Lt.-Col. Otter was, notwithstanding his protestations, unanimously elected, but aving declined to accept the position, Lt.-Col. Gibson was re-elected. He also eclined to act and several other names having been suggested, officers were finally ected as follows:—President, Wm. Mulock, M.P., vice-presidents, 1st Military Dis-ict, Lt.-Col. THE RANGE QUESTION.

Lt.-Col. Otter explained his position on the range question. He said he was one the members of the council who had opposed any negotiations with the city council the Industrial Exhibition Association. He opposed their ovetures because he was mly confinced that if the exhibition association once got a foothold the grounds ould soon be lost entirely. His action in the matter was altogether due to his wish at no injury would be done to the interests of the O.R.A. Did he think those incrests could be furthered or left unimpaired by some arrangement in the direction proosed by either of the bodies he had referred to, he would give in gracefully, but eantime he was compelled by conviction to maintain so far as he could the attitude e had already assumed.

The president suggested that a committee, consisting of the president, Lt. Cols. tter, Gibson, Macdonald (Guelph), and Capt. Bruce, should be appointed to receive ommunications from the city or exhibition association to act in the matter generally, nd to report to a future meeting of the council. The suggestion was agreed to.

The president intimated that the board of enquiry into the state of the ranges ould meet on September 8, and would make recommendations as to the adoption of les providing for the future use of the ranges, if such were found necessary; upon hich the meeting agreed that the ranges would be declared closed from the close of e O. R. A. matches at present going on until the report of the board of enquiry ould have been submitted.

Dominion Rifle Association Prize Meeting.

THE annual prize competition of the Dominion Rifle Association opened on Monday morning under very happy auspices, the weather being fine, and the outlook in all respects good. The competitors from distance had nearly all arrived in Ottawa early enough to secure their ickets and make other arrangements on Saturday, and thus a great mount of confusion was avoided on the opening morning. Rideau hill presented much the same appearance as usual, though there was a noticeble increase in the number of tents pitched, as not only is the attenlance this year larger than ever before, but a larger proportion have preerred to go under canvas rather than live in hotels for the week.

At half-past eight Monday morning the first gun was fired, and upon he sound of the second, fifteen minutes later, the thirty-five targets prorided for the meeting rose into view and the firing commenced, simulaneously at the 500 yards range for the Nursery match and Extra series, at 600 and at 800 yards for extra series.
