

THE HONOURABLE LEO CADIEUX, M.P.

The Hon. Leo Cadieux was born May 28, 1908 in St. Jerome, Quebec. He attended St. Jerome Commercial College and is a graduate of the Seminary of Ste. Thérèse de Blainville.

Mr. Cadieux was on the editorial staff of La Presse of Montreal from 1930 to 1941. He was then loaned to the Department of National Defence and served as associate director of public relations in the Canadian Army, a civilian appointment, until 1944. In 1944, he was a war correspondent for La Presse of Montreal reporting from the United Kingdom and France.

Following the war, Mr. Cadieux became a director of the publications L'Avenir du Nord and La Revue Moderne. In 1948, he was elected mayor of St. Antoine-des-Laurentides, for a two-year term.

Mr. Cadieux was elected Liberal member for the Quebec riding of Terrebonne in the June 1962 general election and retained his seat in the 1963 and 1965 elections. He was appointed associate Minister of National Defence in February 1965 and Minister of National Defence in September 1967. In the June 1968 general election, he was re-elected, this time as the Liberal member for the new Quebec riding of Labelle and re-appointed Minister of National Defence.

Mr. Cadieux and his wife, the former Monique Plante of Mont-Laurier, reside in St. Antoine-des-Laurentides, and have one son, Fabrice.

PAUL ANDRE BEAULIEU

Mr. Beaulieu was born in Outremont, P.Q., in 1913 and attended the Collège Sainte-Marie in Montreal and the Université de Montréal from which he received a B.A. and LL.L. From 1938 to 1940 he practiced law in Montreal. In 1947 he was created King's Counsel and in 1957 was elected Fellow of the Royal Society of Canada.

Mr. Beaulieu joined the Department of External Affairs in 1940 and saw service abroad at Canadian diplomatic and consular missions in Washington, Paris, Boston and London. In 1958 he was appointed Canadian Ambassador to Lebanon and Iraq; he held this post until 1961 when he was named Canadian Ambassador to Brazil. In 1967 to 1968 Mr. Beaulieu was Associate Permanent Representative and Ambassador of Canada
