The Advisory Council's report has supported the recommendations put forward by the New Democratic caucus on the Atlantic Canada Opportunities Agency, and on the need to concentrate on the traditional industries of Newfoundland, such as the fishery, as a source of future employment and prosperity.

On ACOA, the report supports the New Democratic caucus proposals to have board members of the agency include representatives of business, labour, and social organizations, which proposals were rejected by the Government. The council supports the New Democratic Party's proposal that ACOA funding be allocated to Newfoundland on the basis of its economic disparity, rather than to be treated as if its needs were the same as the other maritime provinces. It supports the long-held view of this Party that it is time for Canada to adopt a policy of full employment for our young people based upon the Swedish model.

Newfoundland and Labrador will need 80,000 new jobs between now and 1995 in order to meet their needs. Only 18,000 are ever likely to be created under current policies.

Hibernia is not the answer, and never will be for the unemployed of Newfoundland. New approaches are needed.

I call upon the Minister of Employment and Immigration (Mrs. McDougall) to announce immediately that she will implement the proposals and recommendations of this committee so that the unemployed of Newfoundland will have some hope for the future.

CANADA-UNITED STATES FREE TRADE AGREEMENT—POSITION OF LEADER OF THE OPPOSITION

## RAIL SAFETY TASK FORCE REPORT

Mr. Sergio Marchi (York West): Mr. Speaker, the Minister of Transport (Mr. Bouchard) has now received a report from the federal Rail Safety Task Force, and as we have learned from one of the task force members who issued a minority report a few weeks ago, the charge was that the task force was biased in favour of the railway lobby and that a plan to relocate rail lines for dangerous goods transportation away from the Metropolitan Toronto area, and other urban centres, to less populated areas, was only recommended for further study based on the question of economics. I beg to differ.

The question of relocating railway lines and slowing down railway speeds should not be settled on the basis of economics but on the safety and viability of communities living along those railway lines. Various neighbourhoods in my own riding of York West are already burdened and frustrated with the noise levels and vibrations and the de-evaluation of their properties because of these railway lines. They do not need another threat of dangerous spills in their community.

I ask the Minister, in preparing a response, to take a lesson from the mishaps that have already occurred and to establish that the fact of safety must be the first, the foremost, and the undisputed priority for this Government to consider.
