I am in favour of a statement being published to all the dentists of B.C. and Quebec stating what the desires and requirements of the D.D.C. are at the present time and that to bind the whole of Canada into a united Dental Profession the D.D.C. will do xxxx everything possible in justice to all the Provinces.
