

CORN BELT GETS TOUCH OF RAIN

Consequently Prices Recede Somewhat. But Wheat Showed Some Firmness.

CHICAGO, Aug. 11.—Rain relief, which, however, missed Kansas and most of Missouri, brought about a set-back today in price of corn. The final trading was nervous at a net decline of 3-5c to 5-8c. Wheat closed unchanged to 1-8c higher, about the same as Saturday night to 1-4c up and provisions varying from a shade off to 25c advance.

Heavy selling took place in the corn pit, especially at the opening. Many belated tons were sacrificed and some shorts became aggressive, taking the ground that the current prices more than discounted all of the damage in sight. A noticeable increase in rural offerings of old corn added a good deal to the bearish sentiment that prevailed.

Wheat is Firmer.

What developed here was a result of opinion that cold temperatures in the Dakotas and Minnesota and the persistent rains there might exert a dampening influence on a large proportion of the crop in that region is ready to cut. Weakness early was due to sympathy with corn and to lower cable and good sized world shipments.

Thrashing delays and possible impairment of quality, because of wet weather, gave strength to oats. Beans, too, had control at first owing to the break in the corn market.

Provisions ranged lower after a brief uptick, caused by higher prices for hogs. Corn less expensive and selling credited to packers was responsible for the decline.

WILL INTRODUCE DUAL PURPOSE COW

Professor Day Brings Back Valuable Short horns From Great Britain.

QUELPH, Aug. 11.—(Special).—Professor George E. Day of the Ontario Agricultural College, arrived from England today. He was five weeks away and spent all his time visiting the breeders of the famous English milk and beef strains of short horns. He purchased twelve head, eleven for the college and one for the experimental farm at Month's in Northern Ontario. This is the government's intention to make it possible to introduce in the province, a good milking cow which will produce also milk which can be fed for beef purposes, or if the cow is kept in her milking abilities, she can be easily fattened for beef. Should the experiment succeed, it will prove a great boon to the province.

COMING TO MAKE REPORT ON CANADA

Distinguished Welshman to Tour Country in Interests of Immigration.

To investigate the advantages of Canada from an emigration and financial standpoint, as against other countries, and report back to the people from platform and thru the newspapers, Sir Marchant Williams, Sir John Courtis and William Davies of Cardiff sailed from Bristol on the Canadian Northern liner Royal George on Saturday. They were accompanied by S. W. Pugh, Canada's representative in Wales, and the entire journey has been arranged, and will be carried out under the auspices of the Dominion Government. Mr. Davies is editor-in-chief of the Western Mail, and his two colleagues are heavy contributors to important Welsh and other journals. It is understood their investigation will be very thorough. It is expected that Canada will reap the benefit in an increased emigration to the Dominion from Wales as one result of their journey.
