Sir John Mordaunt informed the Court, the Number of Artillery Horses were Forty.

THE HONOURABLE MAJOR-GENERAL EDWARD CORNWALLIS being sworn, and desired to inform the Court, what he knows in regard to the Opinion of the Sea Officers, as to the Difficulty of landing in the Night of the 28th, deposed, that he went on board the *America*, the Ship appointed for the Rendezvous, about Ten or Eleven o'Clock that Night, and was there some Time before Sir John Mordaunt came; there were several Captains of Men of War on board, and the Deponent found by them, that the landing, in their Opinion, would be dangerous, almost impracticable, and Madnefs in a Manner to attempt it. The Deponent had much Discourse with Captain How in particular, who expressed himself with a great deal of Warmth, and seemed very uneasy at the Undertaking; he said there would be at least six Hours in towing to get to the Shore against a Head-Sea, and likewise five or six Hours more before a second Embarkation
