

# Great Powers Not in Unison.

PARIS, Nov. 1.—(Can. Press).—A policy of territorial "disinterestedness" is to be carried out in the Balkans, if France, Russia and Great Britain have their way. The terms of the accord have not yet been made public.

France, Russia and Great Britain are ready to subscribe to it, but the powers of the Triple Alliance—Germany, Austria and Italy—under the leadership of Austria, still hesitate. The alleged understanding between Austria and Serbia on the subject of the status of Bosnia and Herzegovina, which it had been hoped would mean that Austria finally had decided that Salonika was not worth a war, and which would have cleared the way for the new program, was officially denied tonight by the Serbian minister in Paris.

M. Poincaré, the French premier, who is working untiringly for peace, does not despair, however, of eventually rallying all the powers under the banner of "disinterestedness," which he believes the surest and perhaps the only means of averting a general war.

### North Toronto

The all-absorbing subject of annexation around North Toronto is annexation. "What do you think about it?" will the town be better off by being annexed than it was as a separate municipality? These and numerous other questions are being asked every day, but as a rule the question concludes with the remark, "Well, we are escaping the uncertainty we had to contend with for a number of years and annexation had to come eventually, so we might have it just as well as last, and after all the town's salvation rests in annexation, for as a separate municipality we might never have escaped a two-fare railway system for a short ride of four miles, and a three-fare system for a five mile ride."

Alderman Wainwright expressed himself as delighted that the two municipalities should be merged into one and ventured to say that this annexation will solve the municipal transportation problems, for he had no doubt that the city will establish a car line on both east and west parallel streets with all the despatch possible and he himself will move for it as soon as the opportunity presents itself. To his mind North Toronto should have been part of the city years ago instead of extending it to the east and to the west. This adding of additional territory will be the solution of the overcrowding of the congested districts of the city, "and what is more," he interpolated, "the land in North Toronto is worth twice as much as yesterday; at least, I would not sell my North Toronto property for the same price I would have sold it a week ago."

### Ward Seven

Again the monthly report of Ward Seven building permits, given The World last night, shows a phenomenal increase over all other years in the town's history. W. J. Armstrong, building inspector for Ward Seven, states that during October 72 permits were issued, including 42 dwellings, at a total cost of \$22,000. Last October the 51 permits issued amounted only to \$10,000, showing an increase of \$12,000 in a month's time. The only large item in the list was the new addition to the St. Lawrence Hotel.

### PETER ARNOT'S ESTATE

Late Contractor Left \$64,781 to Widow and Nine Children.

Peter Arnot, contractor, who died on October 3, left \$64,781. The provisions of the will are as follows:

To pay to the widow, Elizabeth Arnot, \$1200 per annum, out of the income of the estate, and to allow her the use of the family residence until her death.

The balance of the income of the estate is to go to the nine surviving children, Mary Smith of Calgary, W. Arnot, J. L. Arnot, D. Arnot and N. E. Arnot, all of Toronto, Edith Newman of Omaha, Neb., and the other children in Toronto, Charles, Byron, and Helen Arnot.

For ten years after the death of the widow, the whole income of the estate is to be divided among the children, and at the end of that time the estate is to be sold and divided equally.

The sons are allowed to lease the property to carry on the business at not more than \$1200 a year and axes. The lease must not be for more than ten years, and at the end of that time the business must be sold.

Provision was also made for some smaller legacies.
