DEMAND FOR ALCOHOL EXCISE DUTY FREE

Manufacturers Pass Resolution to Petition Government to Allow Its Distillation.

MANY MOTIONS PASSED

Quebec Treasurer, President and Others Speak at Banquet in Evening.

Montreal, June 12.—The Canadian Manufacturers' Association brought its annual convention, which has been held at the Windsor Hotel, to a close with an informal dinner tonight at which the speakers were: Mr. J. B. MacCallum, chairman of the association, the newly-elected president; Hon. Walter Mitchell, provincial treasurer of the Province of Quebec; James E. Emery, member of parliament for the National Association of the United States, and others.

Today was crowded with important business, including the hearing of addresses on the chemical industry by Prof. W. L. Goodwin, the chairman of the Canadian section, Society of Chemical Industry, Kingston, and Dr. A. B. MacCallum, chairman of the honorary council of scientific and industrial research, a number of resolutions relative to industrial and scientific research, housing and fire protection, in which the federal and provincial governments were called upon to interest themselves, were passed. A motion seeking to secure, after petition to the federal government, excise duty free alcohol for industrial and medicinal purposes, and which can be made in the now idle Canadian distilleries by a process that is not concerned with either material will be, it was decided, the basis for action by the association's executive committee.

During the morning the delegates elected W. J. Bulman, Winnipeg, as next year's president. Most of the afternoon was spent by them in a trip around Montreal's harbor.

C. P. R. Badly Treated.

The federal government has treated the C. P. R. in an iniquitous manner by its railroad policy was the statement of James A. Ridd, of Toronto, chairman of the transportation committee of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association, made while presenting the transportation committee's report.

Mr. Ridd followed up the contention of claiming the C. P. R. has two railway cripples on its hands, and is doing all that is possible to create a third by levying heavy taxes upon the C. P. R. he said.
