

EXTENSIVE FRONT HELD BY CZECHES

Line Now Extends to Point Hundred Miles Off Odessa.

Vladivostok, Sept. 20.—The Czech-Slovak troops in European Russia, according to the chief of staff, General Galda, commander-in-chief of the Czech-Slovak forces in Siberia, runs from Yekaterinburg, on the Asiatic side of the Ural Mountains, to Krasno-Ufimsk, 100 miles west of Yekaterinburg, to Kazan, 400 miles east of Moscow, to Yekaterinburg, south of Kazan, and then to Nikolayev on the Black Sea, 100 miles east of Saratov, on the right bank of the Volga, in the hands of the Russian red guards, but Tsaritsyn, on the Volga, 300 miles south of Saratov, has been occupied by the Czechs.

General Horvath, the head of the provisional Siberian government, has received here the members of the local government have gone to Omsk to ascertain their standing with the Siberian government.

On the recommendation of the entente allied consuls at Vladivostok, the weapons of General Horvath's troops, who were recently disbanded, have been returned to the Czechs and given back to the troops on the understanding that the men would join General Bennett's Czech army.

The strike of railroad employes on the Chinese Eastern Railway has been adjusted.

EXPLAINS REASON FOR C.N.R. BRANCH

Vancouver, B.C., Sept. 20.—A reply to Lord Shaughnessy's criticism today of the construction of the Canadian Northern Railway branch from Nainst to Sooke on Vancouver Island by the provincial government was given by Hon. John Oliver, premier, last night. The premier declared the rails were being laid to open up extensive spruce belts and that the federal government, and not the provincial government, was behind the construction of the line, and that when rails could be secured, replace the rails used.

AMERICAN AIR ESCORT THANKED BY BRITISH

With the American Forces on the Lorraine Front, Sept. 20.—The commander of the American aero squadron on this front has received the following letter from the chief of the British aerial forces with which the American squadrons have been co-operating:

PROVIDES WATER FOR MILITARY HOSPITAL

Vancouver, B.C., Sept. 20.—According to news brought on the steamship Niagara, which arrived here yesterday morning, the Australian government will place an income tax of five per cent. on the new war loans of the government. There has been no income tax, but in future there will be a tax on the five per cent.

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INVESTIGATING PEAT IN ELGIN COUNTY

St. Thomas, Sept. 20.—An engineer of the branch of the government mines department of Ottawa was in St. Thomas today investigating some peat deposits in Elgin County near this city. His findings were that the peat deposits, although of excellent quality, was too limited in area for profitable development, as he estimated that there would be more than 3000 tons of fuel available. The samples from the Dutton swamps were also of good quality, and he learned that these consisted of about 1000 acres. He stated he would return in a few weeks in making a thorough survey of the deposits.

NOT A CIVILIAN CASE

Case Against "Foghorn" McDonald Withdrawn to Permit of Court-Martial. Ottawa, Sept. 20.—The militia department wishes to correct a statement appearing in the morning papers with regard to the withdrawal of the prosecution of Major "Foghorn" McDonald for wearing a uniform when not actively employed in active service. The department points out that he was prosecuted for an offence under the provisions of an order-in-council which provided only for civil proceedings. This order-in-council was cancelled by a later one under which the prosecution was withdrawn.
