Correspondence Between the British and French Authorities.

Salisbury Takes a Firm Stand in the Matter.

Britain Will Not Admit of a Compromise in the Case.

The Situation Considered Very Grave -Salisbury's Course Sustained by the London Press.

London, Oct. 10 .- The foreign office has issued a Fashoda, blue book, giving the correspondence between the French and British Governments.

It begins with a dispatch dated Dec. 10, 1897, from Sir Edmund Monson, British ambassador at Paris, to Lord Salisbury, referring to rumors of the massacre of the Marchand expedition, and expressing the ambassador's satisfaction that he has been allowed to acquaint M. Hanotaux, French foreign minister, with Lord Salisbury's view that, if other questions are adjusted, Great Britain will make no difficulty regarding the French claim on the northern and eastern shores of Lake Tchad. The right of any European power, except Great Britain, to occupy any part of the Nile Valley,

ever, is not admitted. M. Hanotaux replied on Dec. 24 in a long dispatch of respectful protest against Lord Salisbury's views.

THE BLUE NILE EXPEDITION. On Aug. 2 of this year Lord Salisbury wrote Lord Cromer, British diplomatic agent at Cairo, giving him instructions that, after the capture of Khartoum, two of the flotillas should ascend to Fashoda and go up the Blue Nile as far as it should prove navi-gable for steamers. Under these instructions, the sirdar was to personally command the Fashoda expedition, and to take a few troops if desirable, the object being to assert Great

Britain's sphere of influence in the Nile Valley. Sir Edmund Monson reported to Lord Salisbury, a communication in which M. Delisse, French foreign minister, announced that Marchand had no authority to decide on questions of right, and had been instructed to abstain from any action likely to lead to local conflict. M. Delisse further expressed a conviction that the matter was susceptible of arrangement

by means of discussion. To this Lord Salisbury replied, on Sept. 9, that Great Britain regarded the operations of the sirdar, General Kitchener, as placing all the territories of Khalifa Abdullah by right of conquest in the hands of the British and Egyptian Governments, and insisted that this contention

ADMITTED OF NO DISCUSSION.

Then follow various dispatches, recording the discussions between Sir Edmund Monson and M. Delisse, the latter explaining that Marchand was now virtually a lieutenant to the Loitard expedition, and that therefore the situation at Fashoda, even if Marchand were there, could not be dangerous, as Sir Edmund Monson had repre-

gented. On Sept. 15-still following the blue book—the sirdar reported the dispatch of his expedition to Fashoda, fully confirming the announcements already cabled to the Associated Press, including the fact that Gen. Kitchener's arrival there prevented a second dervish attack on Marchand. The French officer notified the sirdar that he had concluded a treaty, which he had sent to France for ratification, whereby the Shillocks had placed themselves under French care.

MARCHAND ORDERED TO OCCU- resentation by the powers.

PY FASHODA. Marchand replied in the negative to Gen. Kitchener's question whether he was prepared to resist the hoisting of the Egyptian flag, but he maintained that he had orders from the French Government to occupy Fashoda. On the departure of the British forces Gen. Kitchener notified Major Marchand, in writing, that all transportation of war material on the Nile was

absolutely prohibited. The sirdar concludes: "The chief Shillocks came to our camp and positively denied that they had concluded any treaty with Marchand, while all the Shillocks declared their allegiance to the British Government. Moreover, Marchand was in such a precarious position that nothing could have prevented his annihilation by the dervishes had we been a fortnight later in

crushing the khalifa." BRITAIN'S STAND.

Other dispatches indicate that M. Delisse declined Great Britain's request for the immediate withdrawal of Lieut. Marchand, and that Great Britain agreed to dispatch a message for the French Government as a matter of courtesy, without accepting any responsibility for the results it might entail, and still maintaining that the matter admitted of no com-

promise. In the final dispatch appearing in the blue book, Lord Salisbury, under date of Oct. 3, instructs Sir Edmund Monson to inform M. Delisse that the latter's message to Major Marchand has been sent, but that Great Britain views the Marchand mission as having no special significance whatever.

BRITISH PRESS COMMENT. London, Oct. 10 .- All the morning papers applaud Lord Salisbury's firmness in the Fashoda question, and the fact that he has approved all the do-

ings of Gen. Kitchener.
The Times says: "While not despairing of an amicable settlement, we cannot but think the situation extremely grave. Lord Salisbury has taken up a position from which retreat is impossible after the publication of the blue book." The Daily Chronicle thinks the situa-

tion only "grave on paper, and not in The Daily News says: "We hope

Lord Salisbury will be able to provide a golden bridge for M. Delcasse."

NOT SMOOTH SAILING. London, Oct. 10 .- The Madrid correspondent of the Times says: Although nothing concrete is known, it is the prevailing opinion here that the Paris negotiations are not proceeding with the smoothness that is desirable. The government, it is understood, shares this opinion.

Wash., and Tricked Into

Left Victoria, B. C., Last Night

Canada. Is in Charge of Detective Nickle and Will in All Probability Reach Here on Friday Night and Be Locked Up on the Charge of Murdering P. C.

Madie Brown, the alleged murderer of the late P. C. Michael Toohey, will soon be safe behind the bars of London jail. Detective Nickle has been away for over a week, but his whereabouts have been kept a secret by the police authorities. Brown left Victoria, B. C., last night at 9 o'clock, in cusupon Portugal's observance of the tody of Detective Nickle, and one of the Ontario provincial police, and if they come direct by the C. P. R. the trio will reach here on Friday at 8

> was received this morning: Victoria, B. C., Oct. 10.—Marion Brown, alias Thomas Allen, the crippled mulatto outlaw of Ontario, who has been in the tolls of east by the C. P. R. last night to answer for the wanton killing of Po-lice Constable Michael Toohey, at London, on the 24th of June last. The crime was one of the most cold-blooded and deliberate nature, and the Ontario detectives have consequently exerted every energy to bring the assassin to justice. Step by step brown was traced all the way across the continent to North Yakima, Wash., where Detective Nickle identified him from a photo and description. The identity was confirmed and an Ontario officer was immediately sent west.

TRICKED INTO CANADA. The arrest was made at Yakima, and from there Brown was taken to Seat, tle, while extradition proceedings were initiated. These are always vexatiously slow, and the eastern detective knew a better trick by far. Liquor and morphine were smuggled into Brown's cell, and then he was taken out of the Seattle jail under the firm belief that his liberators were friends. From Seattle he was got to Port Angeles, and from that port the alleged colored killer was brought here by the steamer Garland yesterday. As soon as the boat touched Canadian soil the arrest was made by Constables

Redgrove and Anderson. PUT UP A HARD FIGHT. Although Brown has only one leg, he is prodigiously strong, and fought furiously when he realized that he had

been trapped. The shooting for which Brown must answer to the law was committed while the murdered officer was endeavoring to make an arrest for assaulting a Grand Trunk crossing watchman. The negro, it is alleged, was then chief of a party of tramps, and had been in Ontario but a few hours, and never before in London. In Texas he is reported to have s. record of four killings and several jail breakings. His lawless career was cut short through the vigilance
