### WINNIPEG CARMEN JOIN GREAT STRIKE; UNIONS CALL OUT 16 THOUSAND MORE

Sympathy Walk Out At Manitoba Capital Assumes Gigantic Proportions - City Makes Concessions But Wants the Fire Department Non-Union.

[Special to The Advertiser.] ing more than 3,000 railway shopmen winnipeg, May 22.—At 1 o'clock this morning after meetings of several local unions had carried strike votes, union Northern and Canadian Government unions had carried strike votes, union labor headquarters issued an order calling out 16,000 union men today. This adds to the 12,000 already out. Five thousand more will be called out on Thursday morning, Secretary Robinson declared, including all unions in theatres and picture houses, closing up these amusement places.

The city council, after a long conference with David Campbell, Premer Borden's representative, made concessions to strikers. They will not insist that all civic employees must not strike.

The public utilities continue to run along smoothly, the waterworks and all city or the strikers and provided them at 2 o'clock this morning, when they took their cars to the barns.

The strikers' committee further threatens that the carmen at the rail-way shops will walk out at 9:30 this morning.

Ottawa, May 22.—At the morning sitting of the House of Commons, Hon. N. W. Rowell read an order-in-council passed by the Government yesterday, embodying its decisions regarding the pay of civil servants now enlisted in the overseas forces of Canada.

The net result of the new order-in-The net result of the new order-in-council is that civil servants doing bonafide fighting at the front or who have fought, and been wounded, and are undergoing treatment in Britain or who have fought for least a year and are now required for military duty in England, will continue to receive the pay which they have hitherto received. Mr. Rowell explained that civil ser vants enlisting early in the war were granted both civil and military pay. Those enlisting later were granted whichever of the two happened to be
