It will be pleasing to local lovers of the horse to learn that the matinee races, which have proved so popular in the past, will be continued this season. If there is any better sport than racing and baseball, they have yet to be uncovered. Both are very much similar, inasmuch as they appeal to all classes alike. However, lovers of both games need not fear missing either, for the races will be run off on Wednesdays as in the past, while the ball games will be played on Saturday.

Baseball is gradually emerging from the snowdrifts and the ice-packs. In another week it may be expected that the temperature will get sufficiently warmed up to permit the spectators who insist upon going to the big league parks to view their favorite pastime without being bundled up in overcoats and running the risk of colds and pneumonia. The cold weather and the high winds which have prevailed during the season to date have taken the edge off the starting of the battles for the championships and have also caused serious setbacks to the teams. Every team has gone back so far as physical condition is concerned, and the trips to the sunny south have been almost so much time and money wasted. The chances are that it will be well into May before the players get well thawed out and be in the condition that they were when they returned north three weeks ago.

No one can say whether or not the cold weather this spring will have any effect upon the National League magnates in starting the season later next year. The National Leagues are a hard-headed lot, and they detest giving in upon any plan upon which they have set their hearts.

They will especially hate to give in on this one, and will probably go right ahead again with a long schedule without making any concession to the public because of their belief that such a move would be giving in to the American League. The National League is expected to take the ground that this has been an exceptional spring—if any one could call it the gentle springtime—and that next year the weather may be different.

At any rate, their action this year has been a very expensive one to them. Their anticipated profits on the early games have vanished like the snowflakes which fell last Friday, and it will require some enormous crowds to wipe out the losses to date. The Cincinnati Club alone is out \$14,000 on the season so far.

CARTER HANDICAP WINNER BEATEN

Glorifier Second to Dr. Gardner in \$10,000 Excelsior at Jamaica.

New York, April 26.—Dr. Gardner, Timothy D. Sullivan's big bay Banrockburn-Garda 4-year-old colt, won the \$10,000 Excelsior handicap at Jamaica today in the easiest way. Glorifier, winner of the Carter handicap, was second, and Cairngorm third. The distance was a mile and a sixteenth, and the time 1:48 1-5. Dr. Gardner opened at 4 and closed at 7 to 1. In the betting, Glorifier had little support at 12 to 1, while Cairngorm receded from 6 to 1 to 10 to 1 at post time. W. H. Carey and King's Daughter closed equal favorites at 7 to 2. The Belmont pair, Don Diego and Okonite and J. C. Core, held 8 to 1 throughout. The others stood at odds ranging from 20 to 50 to 1. Kentucky's representative, King's Daughter, was probably the most fancied horse in the race, but, like W. H. Carey, was crowded out at the first turn, and never had a chance thereafter.

Perfect weather brought out a crowd of 20,000 to witness the handicap and the other five races on the card. But two favorites won—Robin Hood and Handsarra.

The fourteen starters in the Excelsior were sent off to a fairly good start, with Dr. Gardner going to the front at once. On the first turn there was much crowding, and several of those running well up in front were bumped about, losing their favorable positions and all chances of success. Excellently ridden by Jockey Martin, Dr. Gardner escaped the mix-up and had clear running. Glorifier and Cairngorm also being among the fortunate ones. There was no exciting incidents to stir the crowd. Dr. Gardner maintained his great swinging stride to the finish, with no need of urging, while Glorifier, Cairngorm and Philander trailed along in the order named. The others, hopelessly beaten, finished as they pleased, Carey being sixth and King's Daughter eleventh.

The third race, a 5½ furlongs handicap affair, proved the best of the day. Handsarra, Voorhes and Pretension finished heads apart, the winner being finally ridden by J. Martin. The winners—Robin Hood 7 to 20, Biskra 8 to 1, Handsarra even, Dr. Gardner 7 to 1, Mary Morris 15 to 1, Tartar Maid 5 to 1.
