J. E. Hodgins of Kincardine, a Former Conservative, Is Told His Son Would Have Got Exemption Easily if He Had Kept is D --- Mouth Shut.

KINCARDINE, Dec. 14.—The political pot in North Bruce is more than boiling. John MacAulay, the Independent Liberal, will surely win the riding on Monday next. Col. 




