Ice Scarce, But Dealers Expect To Supply Demand

Will Take No New Customers—May Import From Owen Sound.

Although ice will be very scarce this summer, local dealers declare that they would not be inclined to say that there will be an ice famine. One ice man has only one ice-house filled, whereas

last year he had two houses filled.

No new contracts will be taken and the old customers will have to be content with a limited supply. The prices, it was said, would be about the same. The ice this year, in this locality, is only six inches thick. Last year it was ten inches thick.

Those ice men who cut ice on the Cove expect to get some more ice this season. They say that the ice is there, but that it is doctored over, and that when a cold spell of weather comes they will cut it.

There has been some talk of shipping ice into the city from Owen Sound. This it was said, would be somewhat expensive, and the hauling from the railroad to the ice-house would probably be the cause of making the price soar a little.

PROTEST OF G. W. V. A. RECEIVES CONSIDERATION

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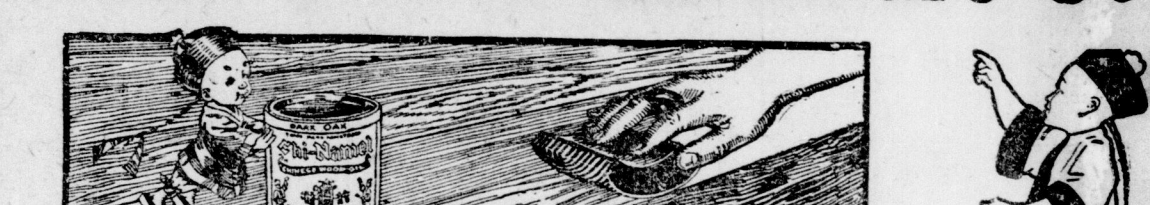
