The question of uniform rates for electrical power was brought before the convention of the Western Ontario Associated Boards of Trade held in London last fall, when the cause was eloquently championed by Mr. Hume and Mr. Bowden on the ground that if hydro power is genuinely a "public utility," all municipalities should benefit equally and have the same opportunities for development through the service of such power, whatever their location. One of their arguments for equalization of rates is the postal system, whereby a letter is carried a few miles or to any part of Canada for the same rate.

They claim this equalization should apply also to a public utility such as water power. The question of uniform rates for elec-


