'I withdraw my plea of 'not guilty' and plead 'guilty,' 's said Capt. Minard. To the other two charges, those of forging the name of W. E. Forsyth and W. E. Freeman, he answered similarly. **ALMOST AS HOT IN** LONDON AS MALTA: YOU DON'T FEEL IT

Returned Nurse Says Humidity Over There Bad.

HAD INTERESTING WORK

Men Who Came To Hospitals Not Only Wounded But Sick.

"It's almost as hot here as in Malta." said a nurse today who has just returned home after almost four years of overseas service, eighteen months of which were spent in Malta.

"We had the siroccos in Malta," she continued, "and that seemed to take all your vitality. I don't think the thermometer went abova 100 degrees while I was there, but the humidity is so great it is very trying.

"Here, the shade is refreshing. The hardest thing of all in Malta is the glare of the sun, which strikes on the rocks and hits back on your eyes. There are no trees or shrubs there. We weren't are no trees or shrubs there. We weren't allowed to go out without colored glasses and umbrellas, and the officers wore khaki helmets lined with green."

With Imperial Army.

The nurse in question was attached to an Imperial hospital unit as an Imperial nursing V. A. D. at Tigne.
"Previous to the war," she says, "the buildings subsequently converted into hospitals were used as barracks. Like all buildings on the island, which is seventeen miles long by nine wide, the barracks had been built for coolness with stone floors and shutters.

"One thing we had in Malta which we very much appreciated, and that was the sea bathing, which was both cooling and invigorating, even if the water was tepid in the summer time."

Concerning her overseas experience, she states: "Perhaps the most interesting work of all was in Malta, where we had real sickness to combat and disease to overcome. The patients were mostly brought there from Saloniki, and

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
