## YOUNG TURKS SEIZE CONTROL OF ASIA MINOR

## ITALIAN KING RATIFIES PEACE TREATIES BY A ROYAL DECREE

Pact Between Germany and the Allied Powers Becomes Effective Since the Third One of the Great Nations Signs Approval of Agreement—Italy Is First of Large Nations To Ratify Treaty With Austria.

Paris, Oct. 7.—King Victor Emmanuel of Italy signed a royal decree ratifying the German and Austrian treaties yesterday, according to a Milan dispatch to the Eclair.

Ratification of the German treaty by the royal decree of the king of Italy virtually completes the steps necessary for putting into effect the pact between Germany and the Allied powers, which was signed at Versailles on June 28, and which stipulated it would become operative when ratified by three of the great powers. The British Parliament has already ratified the treaty, and the document now awaits only the signature of King George before becoming effective in Great Britain. Approval was given the convention by the French chamber of deputies last week and the senate is expected to ratify it on Friday or Saturday. The royal decree of the Italian monarchy must receive approval from the next parliament, which will meet at Rome on December 1, but it is considered certain there will be little trouble in securing concurrence.

Italy, by the reported action of her king, is the first of the powers to ratify the treaty with Austria.

## STEEL TOWN OF GARY IS UNDER MILITARY RULE

Eleven Hundred Federal Soldiers Sent to Affected Area.

GOVERNOR MADE APPEAL

Call Was Issued When the Strikers Disregard the Mayor's Order.

Gary, Ind., Oct. 7.—Gary, the site of one of the United States Steel Corporation's greatest plants, affected for more than two weeks by the strike in the steel industry, today was under military control of approximately 1,100 federal soldiers, commanded by Major General Leonard Wood, commander of the central department of the army. Five hundred more troops, fresh from riot duty at Omaha, Neb., were on their way here by train. The call for federal troops was made by Governor Goodrich of Indiana, after thousands of strikers paraded and held mass meetings after being forbidden by the mayor, the police and the army. About 300 state militiamen stationed at Gary.

## KING GEORGE SENDS SYMPATHY TO U. S. PRESIDENT AND WIFE

British Sovereign Makes Inquiry as to Wilson's Condition.

London, Oct. 7.—King George, who is greatly concerned over the illness of President Wilson, today sent his private secretary, Col. Clive Wigram, to the United States embassy to seek the latest news regarding the president's condition. Col. Wigram also was instructed to express His Majesty's sincere sympathy with President Wilson and Mrs. Wilson.

PRESIDENT WILSON BETTER. Washington, D. C., Oct. 7.—President Wilson "showed further improvement" this morning after a very good night, and is anxious to get back to work, White House officials said.

## BOLSHEVIK DEFEAT IS CONFIRMED BY MOSCOW WIRELESS

Stockholm, Oct. 7.—An intercepted Russian Bolshevik wireless message from Moscow confirms the report that the Bolsheviks have been forced to abandon the town of Dvinsk, between old Russia and Persia. The message received here from Riga, the Red troops evacuated the place after they had been defeated in violent fighting.

Cincinnati, Oct. 7.—Cincinnati today greeted her returning victorious baseball team, while everything was in readiness for a resumption of the world series of 1919 between the White Sox and Red Sox at Redland Field this afternoon. The forecast of the weather bureau for Cincinnati was fair and cool.

The victories of Manager Moran's men at Chicago have only added to the enthusiasm that was displayed here during last week, and today's attendance promises to be greater than ever, if such a thing is possible. The weather man was exceptionally kind during the two games played here last week, and indications were for fair weather, although the torrid baseball weather of last week can hardly be looked for.

The announcement that comes from Chicago that Moran will pitch today leads most of the fans here to believe that an additional game on Wednesday will not be necessary. Gleason of the visitors, will in all probability use Kerr, the pitcher that scored the only victory over the Reds.

From the season in the American League, the largest crowd that has witnessed any game in Cincinnati would be at the ball park this afternoon.

## MANAGER OF WHITE SOX DECLARES HE IS 'SICK AT HEART'

Chicago, Ill., Oct. 7.—Manager "Kid" Gleason of the White Sox, before leaving for Cincinnati, where the sixth game of the world series is to be played today with the Reds, said he was "sick at heart" over the way his men had played the game.

"I don't know what's the matter," said Gleason, "but I do know that something is wrong with my team. The team I had fighting in August for the pennant would have licked the Reds without a struggle. The bunch I have now couldn't beat a high school team. We hit something over 350 for the season in the American League, and now they are hitting us. I have never seen a ball team ever did in the history of baseball. The way those 250 hitters acted against Eller, they couldn't make a place on a high school team. I tell you I am absolutely sick at heart. I certainly have been disappointed in this series. I have played baseball in a single game. There is only a bare chance they can win now."

"You know it doesn't seem possible that this team that worked so great for me all summer could fall down like this. I tell you I am absolutely sick at heart. I thought all of them were boys. I felt like a school teacher 'light' feet toward his pupils. I loved those boys for the way they fought for me this summer."

## ELLER'S FEAT IS ONE UNEQUALLED

Chicago, Oct. 7.—"Hod" Eller's work in striking out six men in a row, setting Gandhi, Risher and Schalk, in the second, and Williams, Leibold and Eddie Collins, in the third, constitutes a new world series record. It also is a feat that has been very seldom accomplished in any major league game.

Getting Collins was the most noteworthy, because he is not only a star batsman, and a left-handed batsman, but because the count on him was three called balls before a strike was pitched to him. Eller, also, had been out with a strain, with a bad spot on his arm, and he had been having fanned five men in a row before reaching Collins.

Eller's mark for the day, nine strikeouts, is not a series record, however. In the first game of 1912 set, "Woody" of Boston fanned eleven Giants.

## Famous Pianist Abandons Art For Love of Country

Ignace Jan Paderewski Has Not Played Piano For Over Two Years.

Paris, Oct. 6.—Interviewed after the signature of the Austrian treaty, Ignace Jan Paderewski volunteered the information that he had abandoned his art to play the piano. The journalist, after asking the Polish premier numerous questions relating to the political situation in Poland, finally queried: "And your art, Mr. President, have you given it up completely?" "Yes," replied the former artist, "I have forgotten it. I have little time to devote to it now. I have been playing for two years and three months. I do not regret it. I am happy to have sacrificed to the cause of my country what I held most dear."

## PROLIFIC BREEDERS OF BOLSHEVISM IS RABBI WISE'S VIEW

Notes Educationist Flays Head of Steel Corporation and His Associates.

New York, Oct. 7.—Rabbi Stephen S. Wise, of the Free Synagogue, who bitterly attacked Albert H. Gary and other associates in the United States Steel Corporation, as "among the most prolific breeders of Bolshevism" during the course of the strike Sunday, declared yesterday that, if necessary, he is ready to go to Pittsburgh and deliver the same address.

After condemning the "industrial serfdom of the steel and iron workers," Rabbi Wise declared the situation has developed into a conflict between the eighteenth and twentieth centuries. "The eighteenth century is going to lose," said the clergyman.

R. Wise charged that the officials of the steel corporation had "sacrificed and terrorized the workers through coercion and violence. He wound up by saying: 'If I am living then they have redress and they know where to find me.'"

## GERMANY'S LIST OF CRIMINALS IS READY

Paris, Oct. 7.—The newspapers announce that the list of German officials and other persons to be delivered to the Allies for trial are practically ready for submission to Germany. The papers point out that the list does not contain the name of the former emperor of Germany, who is to be dealt with separately.

## WIDOW OF MURDERED FEUDIST FEARS SHE IS MARKED TO DIE

Widow, Two Sisters-in-Law, Now Wait in Terror for the Next Blow.

## GIANNOLA IS BURIED

Bereaved Woman Only One of Family at Grave; Others Behind Locked Doors.

Detroit, Oct. 7.—Sam Giannola, vanquished feudist, was laid to rest Monday morning. But the deadly thing that struck him down still lives, and the heirs to the vengeance that dug a grave for the Sicilian chieftain—the widow and her children—are cringing in the shadow of the black hand that is bent upon wiping out the house of Giannola.

With the funeral of the latest victim of the feud, the survivors recalled more keenly the fact that a few days before the leader of "Little Sicily" fell before a fusillade of bullets, both he and his brother, Nito, received written warnings that the Giannola family to the last child, was to be destroyed.

Fear Haunts Widows. And now, despite efforts to fight off the fear that haunts them, they are facing themselves "Who will be next?" Three women whom the feud has made widows look over their broods with a sickening interest.

"Which one?" The funeral of Sam Giannola, who was killed Thursday afternoon, took place from the family home at Ford City, Mich. The women, who were gathered there for simple services, the room in which the grey-haired widow of Sam Giannola, the widow of Tony Giannola, who fell before feudists ten months ago, and the widow of Sam Giannola, who fell before the chiefs two months after Tony was killed, were huddled together in a room of three grief-stricken women—21 of them.

As the assemblage stood outside the house of mourning, just as the casket was brought forth, the widow of Sam Giannola flung her arms skyward, and cried out in her native tongue. Relatives interpreted the demonstration as a call upon heaven to send down vengeance upon those who had killed her husband.

Then the procession moved off, with a band playing a death march in the street. It led to St. Patrick's Church, Wyandotte, where Rev. Leo Roberts celebrated high mass.

Throughout the ceremony the widow of Sam Giannola, who had acted as bodyguard for Giannola, until he had deemed them no longer a menace to the peace of the neighborhood, was seen to guard their dead chief's children.

## STRIKE AT KINGSTON LOCOMOTIVE PLANT COMES TO AN END

Men Accept Company's Offer and Resume Work.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Kingston, Ont., Oct. 7.—The strike of metal workers at the Canada Locomotive Works, which has paralyzed the industry here, and citizens are rejoicing. The strike started on May 3, and this morning the plant resumed operation for the first time since that date. The strike involved 650 men, and the bulk of them will be back at their work by the end of the week. The men are accepting the company's offer, which is 50 hours' pay for a 45-hour week. This means a 10 per cent increase in wages.

## DANIEL MCINTYRE OF DORCHESTER IS ILL

Daniel McIntyre of Dorchester, who is well known to the farmers of the district, is critically ill at his home in Dorchester. Mr. McIntyre, whose illness has been a familiar figure on the local market for the past 35 years, and in that time has paid out thousands of dollars to farmers for their crops. Farmers attending the market today expressed the earnest hope that Mr. McIntyre would shortly recover, and be back on the job in the near future.

## QUEBEC FIRE-EATER FLAYS UNION GOVT. AND FINDS FAULT WITH LIBERALS

Laverne Approves General Outline of Hon. Mackenzie King's Policy.

BUT STOPS AT THAT

Declares He Will Not Become Slave of Any Party or Chief.

Quebec, Oct. 7.—Criticism of the Liberal program as mapped out at the Ottawa convention is launched out in a letter written by Mr. Armand Laverne to the committee of Liberals formed to organize for the coming bye-elections. The Liberals of this riding formed a committee from whose ranks delegates will be chosen to form the convention that will on Wednesday evening choose the Liberal standard bearer in Quebec East. The committee before allowing candidates to seek the support of the Liberal party in Quebec East, requested from each a declaration of allegiance to Mr. Mackenzie King as the chieftain and to his political faith, and to this Mr. Laverne answered in a letter that professes acid criticism to both the Union Government and the Liberals.

Approves General Lines. "Although I approve in its general lines the policy of Hon. Mackenzie King, and of the Liberal party," says Mr. Laverne, "and although I am a decided adversary of the present Government at Ottawa, I do not wish to be the slave of any chief or party."

Mr. Laverne says he cannot be brought to endorse the war measures that passed, he says, by the complexity of the Conservative Government and the Liberal Opposition, and which allowed the worst abuses during four years. Only a couple of Liberals, he says, opposed such a declaration of allegiance to Mr. Mackenzie King as the chieftain and to his political faith, and to this Mr. Laverne answered in a letter that professes acid criticism to both the Union Government and the Liberals.

## SEVERAL MEN HURT WHEN 1,000 STRIKERS STOP CARS RUNNING

Trouble Occurs On Buffalo and Lake Erie Traction Company.

Buffalo, N. Y., Oct. 7.—Several men were slightly hurt when one was reported wounded by a bullet from a revolver this morning when a crowd of 1,000 men held up cars of the Buffalo and Lake Erie Traction Company between the city limits and Lackawanna. The cars were held up on the tracks held up by the first car, and ultimately blocked six of them carrying workmen to the Lackawanna Steel Company, one of the three local plants closed by the strike. Fusillades of rocks met the cars as they came to a standstill. The women went back and several of them, according to police information, used revolvers. A detail of police hurried to the scene in an automobile patrol, and quickly put the rioters to flight.

## VON DER GOLTZ IS AGAIN WITH REDS

German Commander Joins With Bolsheviks in Baltic Provinces.

Copenhagen, Oct. 7.—Gen. von der Goltz, commander of German forces in the Baltic provinces, whose activities there have recently been the subject of changes between the allied powers and Germany, has, it is stated, joined the Russian Bolshevik forces, according to a Berlin dispatch to the National Tidende, quoting a report from the Petrograd Telegraph Agency. There is no confirmation of the report obtainable here.

## FREIGHT CAR LOAD OF WHISKY SEIZED

Shipment En Route, Montreal to Yorkton, Sask., Was Valued at Nearly \$20,000.

Brookville, Oct. 7.—One of the largest seizures of liquor since the O. T. A. was passed was made yesterday at Smith's Falls, when Inspectors Silvers and Tader of Brookville, seized a freight car which was in transit from Montreal to Yorkton, Sask. The car contained one hundred and thirty large boxes, each containing three, four or five cases of whiskey. The car also carried one hundred and thirty large barrels each containing a 30-gallon barrel of alcohol. The value of the shipment is estimated at between \$15,000 and \$20,000.

## EDITOR OF HARPER'S MAGAZINE IS DEAD

New York, Oct. 7.—Henry Mills Alden, editor of Harper's Magazine since 1889, died at his home here today after a long illness. He was 82 years old.

## MORE THAN 300,000 TURKISH NATIONALISTS PRECIPITATE A GRAVE CRISIS IN ASIA MINOR

Troops Under Control of Mustapha Kemal Bring On Serious Situation That Is Believed To Be Beyond Control of the Turkish Government—Allied Powers Not in a Position To Interfere.

Paris, Oct. 7.—Turkish nationalist troops, said to number upwards of 300,000 men and commanded by Mustapha Kemal, seem to have precipitated in Asia Minor, on a major scale, a crisis similar to that which arose in Dalmatia when Capt. Gabriele d'Annunzio seized the city of Fiume.

There is a feeling that the situation in Asia Minor has gone beyond the control of the Turkish Government and that the Allied powers are helpless, at present, to do anything to bring military pressure to bear and afford any appreciable relief. There are some who question whether the powers are sufficiently united or inclined to intervene. Konial, an important railroad centre, is in the hands of the Turkish nationalist troops. This city, which in the days of Roman power was known as Iconium, and was capital of the province of Licaonia, stands in a position which virtually dominates southern Asia Minor.

## REV. WILLIAM IVENS IS NOMINATED FOR WINNIPEG MAYORALTY

## HUGE SHIPBUILDING ALLIANCE PLANNED

Outlay of Millions of Dollars Is Contemplated.

Montreal, Oct. 7.—A great North American shipbuilding enterprise between Canada and the United States is being shadowed in the visit to Montreal of David Rogers, shipbuilder extraordinary, general works manager of the Skinner & Eddy Corporation of Seattle. Although Mr. Rogers would not give out any details of the scheme, it is as yet in the early stages of completion, it is understood that prominent shipping concerns in Canada have been approached, particularly in Montreal, in this matter and they have received the proposition favorably. The scheme is the establishment of a huge shipbuilding yard in Montreal and several other strategic points along the coast of Canada and the United States, involving an initial outlay of millions of dollars.

## JUGO-SLAVS FORM A NEW MINISTRY

Paris, Oct. 7.—A new ministry for Jugo-Slavia has been formed in Belgrade, according to dispatches received here. M. Trifkovic has been named as premier, it is stated, and M. Trumbitch as minister of foreign affairs.

## HARD TO REACH AGREEMENT.

Paris, Oct. 9.—Advices from Belgrade indicate that up to today (Monday) Mario Trifkovic, entrusted by the prince regent with the task of forming a new cabinet, had not yet completed it. It appears that M. Trifkovic desired to form a ministry satisfactory to the Radicals, so that he might be sure of a majority in the Parliament. The difficulty apparently was in inducing the Serbians and the Croatians to reach an agreement.

## MY WORD, HOW THOSE ENGLISH WOMEN SMOKE!

[Associated Press.] London, Oct. 6.—Cigarette smoking is on the increase in England, especially among women, according to experts. One estimate places the demand for cigarettes at twice what it was before the war. Women smoke a good deal more than formerly. It is said one tobacco man, "and some of them can't even hang out the washing unless they have a cigarette in their mouth."

## FRENCH AUTHORITIES DEMAND EXTRADITION OF COUNT BISMARCK

Grandson of Famous Chancellor Must Answer For War Crimes.

Paris, Oct. 7.—The extradition of Count Otto Bismarck, grandson of the famous German chancellor, has been demanded of the German Government at the instance of court-martial authorities in Lille according to the correspondent of the Eclair. Eight other Germans are also to be extradited, the writer states. Count Bismarck is accused of having had 14 inhabitants of the village of Vicoigne shot "as an example" and of burning several houses there. Similar charges are preferred against the others whose extradition is demanded.

## FORMER PREMIER OF AUSTRALIA IS DEAD

Alfred Deakin Was Prime Minister From 1903 to 1908.

Sydney, N. S. W., Oct. 7.—Alfred Deakin, former premier of Australia, died today.

Mr. Deakin was prime minister of Australia from 1903 to 1908 with the exception of a short period when the Labor party was in power in the Australian Federal Parliament in 1904. Deceased on a vacation in November, 1908. Mr. Deakin again assumed control of the Federal Government in June, 1909, at the head of a coalition of free traders, protectionists and anti-Socialists formed against the latter party.

## ADVOCATES PERMANENT CENTRAL TRADES UNION

London, Oct. 7.—Chairman Gosling of the mediation committee in the recent railway strike asked the members of the central trades union committee, empowered to deal with the Government in all negotiations, "What movement will break the bounds of chaos?" The result of Sunday's settlement of the railway strike merely turned aside the pole of the wedge, which labor was ready to drive home.
