## **FALCONS SAIL FROM** ST. JOHN SATURDAY

Winnipeg Team To Represent Canada At the Olympic Games.

Toronto, March 29 .- (By Canadian Press).-Falcons, Allan Cup winners but officially known as the Canadia Olympic hockey team, will leave Montreal Thursday morning for St. John N. B., and will embark Saturday morning on the liner Melita for Liverpool They will then go to London and proceed to Antwerp via Dover and Ostend The first scheduled game for the Canadian Olympic team will take place on April 20, but if all arrangements are carried out they will arrive in Antwerp five or six days before the first scheduled meeting. The games will take place at the Antwerp ice palace, which is a spacious rink 170 by 58. Seven-man hockey will be played, but no substitutes will be allowed during the game.

tutes will be allowed during the game. Instead of the usual three 20-minute periods, only two periods of 20 minutes will be played.

The O. H. A. rules of seven or eight years ago, it is seen, govern the play at certain points. Secretary Hewitt of the O. H. A. will represent the Canadian Olympic Hockey Association and the C. A. H. A. at the Olympic games.

The Canadian team will arrive four days in advance of the American representatives, and thus will be at an advantage. They will have time to get in good condition befoe the first game.

Although no official announcement has been made, it is understood that Denmark, Norway, Sweden, Belgium, Holland and France will all have representative teams at the Olympic hockey games. Before the war, hockey was not included in the list of Olympic games, and it was not until January that official advices made it clear that hockey would soon be on the Olympic,
