CARD INDEX PLAN FOR ASSESSMENT MAY BE ADOPTED

Committee Will Go Into the Matter Very Shortly.

A card index system of assessment may replace the present mode of valuing property in London, if a suggestion advanced by Mayor Little is adopted. The plan is strongly approved by J. G. Richter, who has been conferring with Assessment Commissioner Grant on the revision of the assessment. Mayor Little states that the aim of the work should be the equalization rather than the increase of assessment, and that the valuations should be made by the expert heads of departments, rather than by men who go out on the general rounds. He believes that the assessment for 1920 has been reasonably satisfactory on the whole.

According to Mr. Richter London's assessment is equal to the average in Ontario cities. He believes that the apportionment between land and buildings might be more. might be more.

A staff that is producing something new is likely to be more inspiring in the class room than one that devotes itself entirely to teaching. Some publications by Western University men have been announced recently.

Professor A. G. Borland, who has joined the faculty this session, has contributed the chapter on British North America to the volume. "The Expansion of the Anglo-Saxon Nations." which has just been issued by the firm A. & C. Black of London, England. The chapter is exceedingly readable and is especially informing to those who wish to see the political development of Canada as a unit of the British Empire. An article on Eugene Fromentin, the French artist-writer by Prof. L. P. Shanks, is to appear in an early number of the Open Court of Chicago. A paper on "Aphrodite; Mother Earth," by Dean W. Sherwood Fox has just been published in the last number of the American Journal of Philology, issued by the Johns Hopkins Press.

It is pobably not known to the general public that research work in literature, language and science is encouraged in Western University by the Arts and Science Club. This club is divided into two sections a literary and a scientific, each section meeting once a month. The appended statement has just been issued bythe literary section. The literary section of the Arts and Science Club is intended to stimulate interest in research as done elsewhere, and to encourage literary scholarship in the humanities. It solicits original papers or notes, accounts of new discoveries of interest to those outside the special field concerned, and, in general, any "chips from the scholar's and teacher's workshop." The literary section is intended to bring together the humanists of the faculty, those interested in the broader field of culture and scholarship, to make them better acquainted with each other's fields and with each other through informal discussions, and incidentally to promote co-ordination through mutual intelligence. 
