

# AUSTRIA BREAKS WITH U. S. UNDER ORDERS OF GERMAN

Publication of Washington's Inner Correspondence With Vienna Shows U. S. Displayed Great Patience in Seeking to Avoid Rupture, But Kaiser Had His Way.

Washington, April 9.—Austria has broken friendly relations with the United States. The breaking of this fact came both from American and Austrian sources today.

Word of Austria's break came simultaneously from Minister Slovák at Bern, Switzerland, saying Austria had taken this important step yesterday and from Austrian Charge Zwiedinck, who called at the state department to notify officials of the break and request his passport. He explained that Austria had broken relations with the United States because of the fact that America had declared a state of war against Germany. He, and the Austrian Government, maintain friendly relations. Moreover it indicated that only German pressure had caused Austria to take this step.

Will Grant Passports.  
Word of Austria's break came simultaneously from Minister Slovák at Bern, Switzerland, saying Austria had taken this important step yesterday and from Austrian Charge Zwiedinck, who called at the state department to notify officials of the break and request his passport. He explained that Austria had broken relations with the United States because of the fact that America had declared a state of war against Germany. He, and the Austrian Government, maintain friendly relations. Moreover it indicated that only German pressure had caused Austria to take this step.

Seize Austrian Ships.  
The state department immediately issued orders to the navy to seize Austrian ships as a "precautionary police measure." While officials would not reveal what their future intentions are, it was assumed that the ship seizures, signified that either Austria or the United States would soon recognize the existence of a state of war between the two governments.

Austria's interests were taken over today by the German minister here and American interests in Austria were turned over to the Spanish minister. Automatically, the United States dropped the words of mercy in caring for millions of prisoners of war in Austrian prison camps.

Under German Pressure.  
No word had come late this evening as to the intentions of Turkey and Bulgaria, though many here believed that these two allies of Germany would be under similar pressure and similarly declare a break in relations. The Austrian break was not unexpected. Every effort has been made to maintain friendly relations and Austria herself had gone a long way in her last submarine note toward adjusting difficulties.

Correspondence Disclosed.  
The Washington announcement follows: On March 18 the department informed the American ambassador in Vienna that this government was deeply desirous of maintaining friendly relations with Austria-Hungary, and in order to accomplish this would be willing to go as far as it properly could. In recapitulating the whole question for Ambassador Penfield's guidance in his discussion of the matter with the Austrian foreign office, the department pointed out that the Austrian note of January 31, declaring almost the same submarine zone as was declared by Germany, was received on the same day that Count Tarnowski arrived in Washington; that it had been explained to Count Tarnowski that this government could not possibly receive an ambassador from Austria and at the same time disavow the German submarine zone as was declared by Germany.

German Steamer Crew Held For Conspiracy at San Juan  
San Juan, P. R., April 9.—Captain Lubinus, Lieut. Henrichel and Engineer Asner of the German steamer KDS were held without bail today after a preliminary hearing on a charge of conspiracy to sink their vessel in the navigable waters of San Juan harbor.

Three Thousand Fishermen On Eastern Coast Strike  
Boston, April 9.—Fishermen operating out of ports between Gloucester and New York numbering more than 3,000 men, were ordered to quit work today in order to call for a general strike issued by the New England Coast Fishermen's Union. The call is an outcome of the union's strike at this point and Gloucester, which has been in effect nine weeks. A reapportionment of the cost of operating fishing vessels which union leaders claim has been an unfair burden on the fishermen, is demanded.

## May Get Argentina's Wheat By Stopping Supply of Coal

United States is Considering Drastic Reprisal With Object of Securing Grain for Entente Allies.

Washington, April 9.—(Special).—Austria has broken relations with the United States. The fact, coupled with semi-official word that the United States may retaliate against Argentina by way of assisting Britain to get sufficient wheat, constituted the day's most important developments in the war situation from the diplomatic standpoint.

It is learned that the United States, as a part of its co-operation with the allies, may retaliate against Argentina's wheat embargo by refusing to supply her with coal. Ostensibly such retaliation is to prevent coal being furnished via Argentina to any German raiders.

But the more important significant motive—if the step finally is taken—will be to force Argentina to supply the entente allies with much-needed wheat.

Penfield's Reply.  
Ambassador Penfield's reply is dated March 22. In it he informs the department that he has endeavored to make the minister of foreign affairs understand the difficulties of the situation in Washington, which the minister generally admitted. At the same time the minister said that the Austro-Hungarian Government considered the situation impossible of continuance.

Not Hostile to Austria.  
Mr. Penfield was asked again to express to the Austro-Hungarian minister of foreign affairs this government's deep regret that the government of Austria-Hungary should have felt itself obliged to join Germany in her submarine policy, thus interfering relations, which we had hoped might remain friendly.

Tool of Germany.  
On April 1 Ambassador Penfield related to this instruction, in forming the department that the minister of foreign affairs had that morning advised him that if the United States declared war against Germany Austria-Hungary would immediately sever her relations with the United States.

ARGENTINE HELPLESS

Buenos Aires, April 9.—Argentina may have to starve herself, but she will bend to pressure applied by England and the United States and probably raise her wheat embargo.

Defence of the wheat embargo Argentine officials pointed out tonight that the measure was solely one of self-preservation. The latest wheat crop was far below normal, and with the high prices for grain in England, due to the blockade, there was every incentive for speculators to drain Argentine dry of her much-needed wheat.
