A FOOLISH TRICK MAY COST TWO LIVES

Two Montreal Girls Fatally Injured in a Runaway.

Montreal, May 28.—Two girls lie at the point of death, and two young men are seriously injured as the result of a foolish trick last night. The four were out driving, and the girls were eating chocolate. When the box was empty, Miss May Lockery threw the box at the horse's head, and the animal was scared and ran away, landing up against a telegraph post and upsetting the buggy.

Miss Lockery and Miss Lizzie Hull had their skulls fractured, and had to be operated on at once, but there is little chance of saving their lives. The Lockerys was driving and is not much hurt, but Leslie Cameron was badly cut about the head.

PT. ARTHUR POWER DAM BURSTS FREIGHT ENGULFED, THREE DEAD

Three C. P. R. Trainmen and Two Others Perish When a Long Train Falls Into Chasm Made By Flood—High Water Caused the Disaster.

Port Arthur, May 28.—Swelled to an uncontrollable height by the heavy rains of several days past, the water behind the storage dam on the Current River broke through the banks last night, and rushing down towards Lake Superior, carried with it all the buildings in the city park, rushed around the city powerhouse and across the Canadian Pacific Railway. In its course about three-quarters of a mile of railway was torn away and when a freight train from the east came along almost immediately after the flood, the engine with several cars plunged over the bridge into the bed of the river, taking with them the engineer, fireman and brakeman, all of whom were killed or drowned. Their bodies have not been recovered. The dead men are Engineer Savard, Fireman McBride and Brakeman Walters.

Damages Will Be Great.

It is also stated that two unknown men, who were being given a ride on the freight train, were drowned or killed. Conductor Rose, though badly

injured, succeeded in stopping the rear part of the train.

The accident has completely crippled the city power plant, destroyed much property and cut off the supply for the car system as well as light and water.

The damage estimates vary from \$100,000 to \$500,000, though it is impossible to make an accurate estimate on account of the fact that the whole district about the powerhouse is still flooded and cannot be inspected.

A number of camping parties were located about the mouth of the river, and it is nothing short of miraculous that they escaped being carried out into the lake by the rushing water.

Had the accident occurred during daylight, with people in the park, as there always are, the number of deaths would have been startling.

Temporary power for the local plants is being procured from the Canadian Northern and it is expected assistance will be procured by connecting with the Kaministiquia lines at Fort William.

Large Attendance at the Art Exhibit

thoroughly enjoyed the exhibit.

Railway Delays Dundas St. Pavement

At the meeting of the board of works, last night the Dundas street pavement was brought up by Ald. Stewart. He pointed out that practically no headway was being made by the London Street Railway and unless something was done immediately, the pavement would not be done by Christmas.

Engineer Graydon reported that the work was being held up by the London Street Railway.

The Barber Company was prepared to go ahead at any time with its work. The street railway company had promised to have its work finished a month ago, but very little had been done. He had written to Manager

King about the matter, but the latter had not replied. Mr. Graydon declared that he would bring the delay up at the council meeting Monday night.

A deputation of High street residents was present and asked that a sewer be laid on that street.

Part of the sewer which has been proposed would be in the township of London and as yet the council of that municipality has not signified its intention to bear its share of the cost.

The deputation was advised to get up a petition for a sewer in the city independent of the township and present it to the city council at once.

Synod of Huron Concludes Labors Bishop Williams Off for England

Rev. Dyson Hague Is Made a Canon and Is Heartily Congratulated.

Yesterday afternoon's session practically completed the meeting of the synod, and last evening many of the delegates left for their homes.

This morning Bishop Williams, accompanied by Rev. R. S. W. Howard, Ven. Archdeacon Richardson and other clergymen who will represent the Diocese of Huron at the Pan-Anglican Congress in England, left for New York where they will sail on Saturday.

A Popular Announcement.

An announcement that caused general satisfaction among all the clergy present was that Rev. Dyson Hague, of the Memorial Church, had been appointed a canon of the Diocese of Huron to take the place of the late Canon Matthew.

The bishop's announcement was heard with enthusiasm, and Mr. Hague received many warm congratulations.

Rev. Principal Waller, of Huron College, presented a report, in which he showed that during the year 27 students had been in attendance at Huron college, of these 23 had written on the examinations. Several students are preparing for mission work in the Northwest fields.

Ten students are taking the combination arts and theological course.

CHINESE DISASTERS
Thousands of Lives Lost by Typhoon and Fire in Mine.

Victoria, B. C., May 28.—The steamer Shimo, of the Japanese line, which arrived Wednesday, brought news of another disaster through a typhoon at Hankow, China, following the disastrous freshet which followed the loss of more than 1,000 lives.

The typhoon came suddenly, and in a few hours reduced hundreds of boats in the Kan River to splinters. Steamers broke away from their moorings, and only those which could get up steam quickly escaped.

The steamer Wu Sang was driven ashore. The Kiang Poo, a paddle steamer, and several other steamers were damaged. The shores were thick with corpses of river people.

Hundreds were recovered before the steamer left Shanghai. News was also brought of a great coal mining disaster at Kwang Si, where 1,000 lives were lost when the mine took fire.
