Keane, Marcotte, Gendreau, Thibaudeau and Dutaud, at Quebec, Charlebourgh, in the Ottawa Valley, Rockland and Sarsfield.

Coupled with this will be found the reports of our Bible Woman in Montreal, Mrs. Scott, and of Miss Piché in Ottawa Valley and elsewhere.

While this has been done in missionary work proper, our indefatigable Field Secretary, Rev. E. Bosworth, has visited Churches, Sunday Schools, Associations and Conventions, to revive and extend the interest in this most philanthropic, and patriotic, and christian work. As usual, we are again very much indebted to the different Ladies' Associations who have so generously contributed to our Treasury, especially the Brooklyn, the Philadelphia, the Toronto, the Ottawa and Montreal Associations. We repeat this year our thanks to the Associational Secretaries, for their kind help in circulating literature among the churches, and for their efforts in obtaining offerings for the Mission. We also recognize our grateful indebtedness to the pastors of churches and superintendents of Sunday Schools all over the large field for kind and devoted co-operation in our work. In this we especially include those of the Maritime Provinces, where in answer to their generous efforts to help us, we are undertaking to provide a suitable laborer among the French population in their midst. It was in view of this that our general evangelist, Mr. Burwash, visited some portions of that field last spring. Twice we thought we had secured the right men to send, when unfavorable circumstances came in the way, the last case being that of Colporteur Gendreau who has had to go to the hospital for a painful operation. We still hope ere long to fulfil our endeavor to send there a suitable and a God sent laborer. Among the many kind auxiliaries of our work, we are happy to recall a debt of gratitude we owe to the generous little English Baptist Church in Quebec, which from the beginning of the work of evangelization there, has been a devoted helper in many ways. Thanks to them for this long standing fraternal interest.

By the energetic labors of the Rev. C. E.
