Mr. Jones was the local liquor license inspector for many years, and the new legislation did away with his office. He is an official who has enjoyed the confidence and respect of the entire city, and his appointment will be a popular one.

POLICEMAN HARVEY RESIGNS

Going Home to Newfoundland - Saint Andrew's Rink For Police Drill

Policeman Harvey, who has been a member of the local force since December 8, 1916, tendered his resignation to Chief Simpson yesterday. The reason given was that the policeman is a wealthy and prosperous fish owner in Newfoundland and he intends to join him in the near future.

ENGINEER TO REMAIN LONGER

Frank MacInnes, engineer of the water and sewerage department, will remain in St. John until November 1. When he was notified of his reappointment to his office in Boston he applied for leave until September 1, in order to complete the work he had on hand here.

WHOLE SEWER RENEWED. The water and sewerage department has completed the renewal of the old wooden sewer extending from Cliff street to Waterloo, replacing it with one of terra cotta, with a certain amount of pipe under the houses. The main starts from Cliff street, opposite Thistle court, runs under the houses and across lots, back to Faddock, thence across lots, again to Peters street and out to Waterloo. At this point it joins the main main which was laid this spring to replace a portion of the same wooden structure, running under the houses Waterloo street to Brasels and thence across to the head of Union.

DIDN'T GO FAR TO GET BOTTLE OF GIN

One Finished in Old Burial Ground, Another Soon Secured; Now a Court Case

Richard Brown was told in the police court this morning by Magistrate Ritchie that he was liable to a fine of \$600 or eighteen months in jail for having liquor in his possession and offering it to two of his friends who were in his company on last Saturday night. To an additional charge of theft of \$17 from George Gillespie, Brown pleaded not guilty. Evidence was taken and he was committed to stand trial.

George Gillespie, master of a sloop now lying at Lower Cove Ship, said that he had invited Brown and a companion in Union street on Saturday night to have "a glass of beer" in a nearby store. The invitation was accepted, but instead of going to the store, the three found themselves in the old burying ground within the shadow of the central police station drinking out of a bottle of gin.

The bottle was finished and thrown away, said Gillespie, and Brown, his companion whose name Brown, said was John Hayes, and the witness started for the foot of Carmarthen street. When there, one said, "I know where we can get more." Gillespie produced his pocket-book, which contained a \$10 bill, a \$5 bill, a \$2 bill and a \$1 bill. He handed the \$1 to Brown who left and came back soon with another bottle of gin.

DOING GOOD WORK ON CANNING OF FOOD. The work of the Home Efficiency Club in this city has been progressing rapidly. The classes are held in the domestic science building in Waterloo street and, under the leadership of Miss Lila White of St. Martin's, the girls are taught how to can food and are given the opportunity to carry on the actual work.

Considerable difficulty has been experienced in carrying on the work in the city owing, it is said, to the fact that perfectly fresh vegetables are hard to secure and also because so many of the girls are out of the city for the summer. In spite of these conditions, the work has been encouraging and it is expected that another year will see the work carried along on a much larger scale.

In the country districts the efforts of the teachers have been even more successful, the results secured being beyond their anticipations. The people have welcomed the idea warmly in many districts and the parents have co-operated in the work and encouraged the children to carry it on. The facts that the food products are so readily accessible and that the classes have proved enjoyable social functions have helped to make the classes popular.

As each member of these classes is expected to can twenty-five quarts of food supplies, the total amount of food available for the winter reserves throughout the province will represent a substantial addition to the resources of the province. The classes have had an indirect result also, as many of the parents have profited by the lessons which their daughters have received.

CHANCE TO JOIN THE ROYAL FLYING CORPS. That officers who have served in the R. F. C. and for various reasons were unable to get overseas, may now have the opportunity of getting in the Royal Flying Corps, is the information that was received in the city this morning.

Not only are such officers to be accepted into the ranks, but they will be provided with pay and allowances. This school was recently organized and in a short time has turned out some very efficient officers. The age limit is twenty-five, except in very special cases. The applicant must be categorized A1, but officers who have served overseas and are suffering from minor physical disabilities will be accepted subject to the recommendations of a medical board, providing they have full use of their limbs and can pass the eye test. They will be required to serve on probation for about three months, and while on probation will draw pay and allowances at C, E, F, rate. When qualified they will be given commissions in the R. F. C. as required. They will be retained in Canada or sent overseas and will be paid in full for their service in the R. F. C. Those officers who wish to serve in this branch of the service, should get in touch with the commanding officer of their unit and from them secure full information.
