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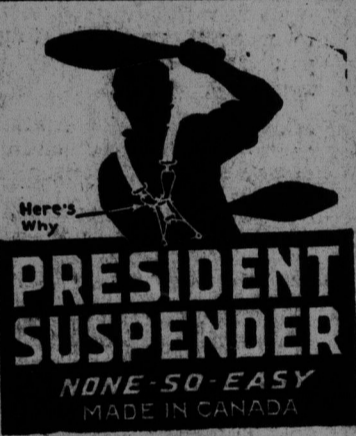


NEW MARITIME TURF RECORDS

315 Heats Trotted or Paced in 230 or Better This Year

FIVE RECORDS BROKEN

Twenty Seven Horses Enter 230 List, and Nine the 220 List, While Others Lower Their Own Records



owned by the latter, lowered the four-year-old trotting stallion record of 2:30 1-4 made by Baron Cecil to 2:19 1-4 when he won the 237 trot at Halifax September 8. The mastiff province stallion record of 2:18 1-4, held jointly by Frank Patch, 2:06 1-4, and Dingola, 2:05 1-2, was lowered to 2:12 by A Game of Chance, owned and driven by W. B. Lint, Fredericton, in his victory in the free-for-all at Chatham, September 20, and which was also the fastest mile of the year. A Game of Chance is by the same sire as Frank Patch, being by the Patchen Boy.

Bob Mac, by Commodore Ledyard, owned by Edgar Campbell, Little Bras

Five maritime province records were broken, some of which have stood for several years.

Mayor Todd, by Todd, owned and driven by his owner, Hammond Kelly, Charlottetown, lowered the trotting stallion record of 2:17 1-4, made by King Afton five years previous to 2:16 1-2, when he won the 219 stake at Halifax on Sept. 10. He equalled this performance again at Charlottetown, making a new track record.

Brags, by Brags, owned by R. H. Edwards, Halifax, and driven by Frank Boutillier, lowered the three-year-old trotting record from 2:29 1-4, held formerly by Brags' Comet and Achille the Great, to 2:20 1-4, when he won the third heat of the 240 stake at Halifax September 8, in that time.

The British Soldier, by Ochocho, owned by Henry Pope, Boston, and leased by W. S. McKie, Charlottetown, and now

Oz, driven by Paris, lowered the record of 2:15 1-4 for a provincial bred pacer on a provincial track to 2:13 1-4 in the third heat of his winning race at Halifax, September 12. This horse also shares the honor with Mudlake, by Winfield Stratton, in making the fastest mile of the year by a provincial bred pacer on the turf this season in 2:13 3-4. Bob Mac's record was made on a half mile track, and Mudlake's on a mile track.

Barty's Comet, owned by W. H. Monaghan, Fredericton, and driven by Sharon, was the fastest pacing male owned in the provinces, with her win-race mile at Gorham, Me., in 2:13 1-4. James K. Newbro, owned by T. C. Edgett, Charlottetown, paced the fastest mile by a mare on provincial track, in 2:12 1-2 at Halifax.

The fastest mile of the year by a horse owned in the provinces was by Frank Patch, owned by J. B. Mitchell, Halifax, when he won the third heat of the 209 pace at Lexington in 2:08.
