

E. A. SCHOFIELD IS TO DIRECT N. B. CAMPAIGN

Accepts Chairmanship of
Drive to Raise King's
College Fund

Former Mayor E. Allan Schofield of this city has accepted chairmanship for the New Brunswick campaign for the University of King's College building fund, which was officially announced today by A. Handfield Whitman, general chairman of the financial drive, and Rev. Dr. A. H. Moore, president of the institution. What plans Mr. Schofield will adopt could not be learned today as he is out of the city for several days.

The campaign in New Brunswick is for an objective of \$75,000 towards the \$200,000 being raised by friends of Kings for building and endowment purposes, of which \$400,000 is necessary to qualify for the conditional offer of the Carnegie Corporation amounting to \$600,000.

A central Saint John city committee will be formed for the appeal in Saint John and Hants. The date of the campaign for the appeal throughout New Brunswick is fixed for June 6-14, inclusive.

Check up Today Makes Changes

In re-checking the points won by the schools in yesterday's local athletic meet, officials this morning discovered discrepancies which alter the grand totals in some instances. Because Don Green, of St. Vincent's school and Breen of St. John the Baptist were both prominent in the winning column, one of the scores credited the St. Vincent boys with winning for St. John the Baptist school. This deducts five points from the latter, leaving that school with only two, and adds five points to St. Vincent's, increasing the handsome score of that building to 35.

Jack Golding's third position in the Class I dash of 220 yards entitled him to one point for King Edward school, which was erroneously chalked up to King George's North End. This makes the Lower Cove building a total of four, and reduces King George's to 9.

PRICE QUESTIONS PORTLAND LINE

Moncton Member Says He Did
Not Receive Information
re Tonnage

OTTAWA, Ont., May 19.—The question of the advisability of disclosing certain information with respect to the Canadian National Railways caused a small sized uproar in the House of Commons yesterday.

A. Dewitt Foster, Conservative, Hants-Kings, called attention to the fact that he had on May 14 questioned the government with respect to the authenticity of a newspaper report to the effect that the Canadian Pacific Railway was planning a new line to the Pacific coast from Winnipeg.

The Minister of Railways, stated Mr. Foster, had replied yesterday that his department had no information with regard to this matter. He would like to know if Mr. Dunlop had spoken for all departments of the government, or merely for his own.

Mr. Dunlop replied that he had spoken only for the Department of Railways and Canals. However, he added, he could find no ministers of the government seated around him who had any information whatsoever in the matter.

O. B. Price, Conservative, Westmorland, then arose to protest against not receiving information in respect to the tonnage handled by the Canadian National at Saint John, N. B., and Portland, Maine. The reply he had received was to the effect that it would not be in the public interest to make such a disclosure. Dr. Price was proceeding to refer to a speech by Premier King in respect to the Canadian National, when he was interrupted by cries of order from the Liberal benches. He persisted, however, until finally Speaker Lemieux intervened and asked that the member for Westmorland not make a speech.
