Pensions Are To Be Made Larger

Recommendations Submitted At Ottawa

Bill in House at Once—Bonuses for Year Added in Some Cases—It Will Mean Increase of \$3,360,000 for Present Year

Ottawa, June 24.—The special committee of conference to deal with the pensions of which Hon. S. W. Rowell is chairman, and W. F. Nickle vice-chairman, presented their recommendations to parliament this morning.

They provide for the following increases in pensions to soldiers and dependents of soldiers, the same to be given parliamentary sanction under the provisions of a bill to be introduced without delay.

(a)—That a bonus for one year of twenty per cent be added to the pensions of privates and corporals (militia) and ratings below petty officers (naval) who now receive \$600 per annum for total disability.

(b)—That a bonus for one year of twenty per cent be added to the pensions of sergeants, etc. (militia) and chief petty officers, etc. (naval) who now receive \$687.50 per annum for total disability.

(c)—That a bonus for one year of twenty per cent be added to the pensions of privates and corporals (militia) and ratings below petty officers (naval) who now receive \$480 per annum.

(d)—That a bonus for one year of approximately thirteen per cent be added to the pensions of sergeants, etc. (militia) and chief petty officers, etc. (naval) who now receive \$810 per annum.

(e)—That the additional pension for a married member of the forces who is totally disabled be increased from \$96 per annum, as it is at present to \$120 per annum.

German Chosen To Sign Treaty Refuses

Von Haimhausen Resigns Rather Than Affix Signature; Completion of Act Thursday or Friday; Clemenceau Thinks He May Now Retire

Paris, June 23.—(By the Associated Press)—Dr. Hansel von Haimhausen, who was on Sunday designated as the German representative to sign the treaty of peace, has telegraphed his resignation from Versailles rather than attach his name to the instrument.

Versailles, June 23.—A member of the German delegation said today that while von Haimhausen had full power to sign the treaty on behalf of Germany, he believed that in view of the gravity of the peace he would prefer to resign.

Paris, June 24.—No word has been received from Versailles relative to the new German plenipotentiaries at Versailles. The date of the ceremony of the signing of the treaty has not yet been fixed, but the belief is gaining ground that it will occur Thursday or possibly Friday.

Clemenceau Would Resign

Paris, June 24.—President Clemenceau has expressed his intention to resign from office as soon as the treaty is signed, according to the inspector, the defendant called him a pimp and other names.
