CONSCRIPTION TO BE ENFORCED

Dublin, April 28.—(By the Associated Press).—The success of the "workless" day last Tuesday has led to a widespread impression among all classes that the government, convinced of the attitude of the people, would refrain from bringing conscription into operation. This view is not shared by the heads of the anti-conscription movement.

A warning was issued today by the Sinn Féin council that the government is committed to the effective application of conscription and confidence to the contrary would be short-sighted. The constitutional nationalist leaders say that there is no sign whatever of a change in the war cabinet's plans and that preparations for carrying them out are being made on a most formidable scale.

It is pointed out, that contrary to the prevailing ideas, an order-in-council may be made effective at once, without waiting for parliament, although parliament has reserved the power, within fourteen days, to annul it.

The anti-conscription fund, of which Archbishop Walsh is trustee, is being actively promoted and is expected to reach unprecedented dimensions.

The Church of Ireland Gazette, the organ of the Protestant Episcopal church, declares that the most lamentable aspect of the present crisis is the tendency to make conscription a religious issue between Protestants and Catholics.

No expectations are entertained anywhere here that the home rule bill whatever its character, will modify opposition to conscription. The Unionist journals have suggested that conscription might be withdrawn if the bishops and the Irish party would make a firm offer to secure the needed men voluntarily. But there is no prospect that such an offer will be made.

The absence of the Irish party from parliament has provoked no objection from the people, though normally they would be expected to attend in full force the debates on the budget, which imposes new taxes on beer and spirits, Ireland's chief manufacturers and also on the farmers. No suggestion has been made that they should return for the home rule bill, but John Dillon, leader of the Nationalists, indicates that if conscription is applied, they will go back at once to ventilate its methods.

Passive resistance continues to be the policy advocated, taking the form of refusal to facilitate inquiries or acknowledge tribunals, which hints at possible effective action regarding the food supply.

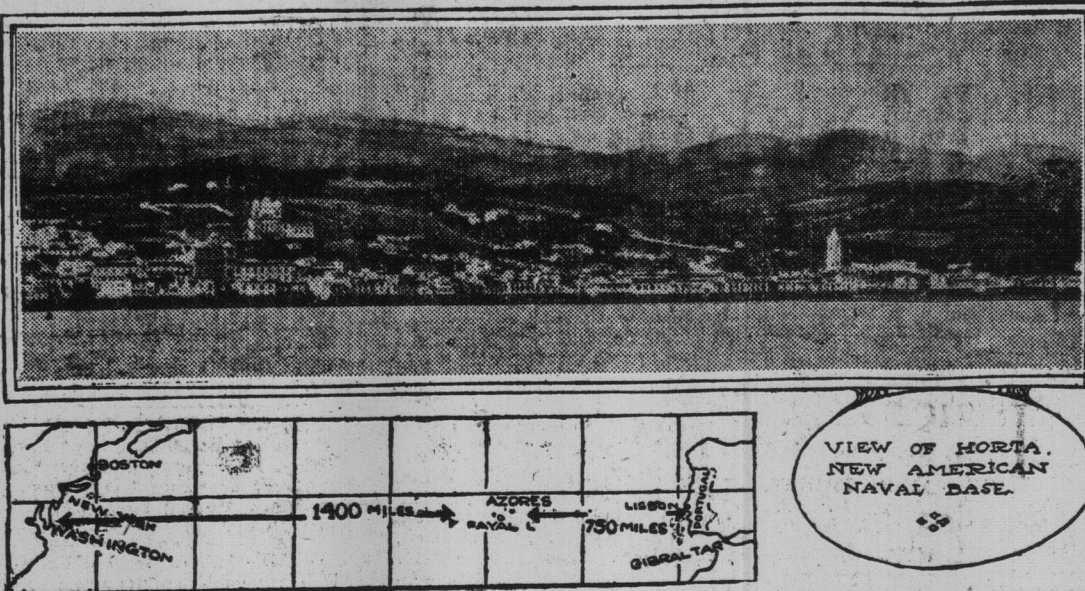

NEW AMERICAN NAVAL BASE AT HORTA

For the protection of the Atlantic trade routes to Southern Europe the United States, with the consent of Portugal, has established a naval base on the Azores Islands. Guns have been landed to begin fortification of the station, which, in addition to being used as a naval base for American submarine destroyers and other small craft, also will serve as an important home station for American airplanes. Y.M.C.A. BOYS' BIBLE STUDY BANQUET
The annual Bible study group banquet of the Y. M. C. A. was held on Saturday night and was the most largely attended and most successful that has yet been staged by that institution. As is the custom each group had its own table and decorated it, in the majority of cases in representation of its name.

Many new and novel designs were in evidence and the scene as a whole was most pleasing. The price for the best decorated table was won by the Algonquians. Their color scheme was in orange and black. In the centre of the table was a large triangle, and hanging from this was a pretty electrical fixture. The Beavers' table, as is usually the case, was one of the foremost. In the centre of the table was a beaver and suspended over all was a large canopy, decorated with electric lights. The Monarchs had a representation of a fighting tank in the centre of their table and this brought forth much praise. Arthur M. Gregg, boys' secretary, presided over the banquet. The Warriors were presented the Bible study cup, which was won by them this year. The presentation was made by Mr. Gregg. A. D. Archibald spoke to the boys of "the earn and give campaign" which is now in progress, whereby 6,000 boys are to give \$60,000 towards war work. The boys are to earn \$10 each and give this in ten monthly installments of one dollar.

Lou Buckley also delivered a very inspiring address on the Soldiers of the Soil movement, and told of the great response that the boys of Nova Scotia are making where already 2,050 have enrolled, all determined to do their bit. Mr. Buckley pointed out the great obligation that rests this summer on each able-bodied boy.

W. C. Cross, chairman of the boys' work committee, also delivered a short address. The remainder of the evening was spent in popular songs, in which all present joined with great heart and vim. A. Coupe presided at the plant and it was largely through his efforts that the musical end of the evening proved to be such a great success.

GERMAN WOMAN SPY?
New York, April 28.—Madame Marie K. De Victoria, believed by officers of the department of justice to be one of the most active of Germany's agents in this country for the last fifteen months, was arrested at a fashionable Long Island hotel Saturday and brought to this city as a dangerous enemy alien.

Madame De Victoria was in a highly nervous condition and was sent to the prison ward at Bellevue Hospital. Miss Margaret Sullivan, her maid, was held as a material witness.

Madame De Victoria, who also has been known as Madame De Vussiere, is said to have come to the United States, through Norway, on January 21, 1917, as a passenger on the steamship Bergensfjord.

She told Captain Roger B. Hull, who questioned her, that she was born in Buenos Aires. Her father, she said, was at one time a captain in the German army, but had been naturalized as a citizen of the Argentine Republic. Captain Hull was frankly skeptical about her story in which she said to have become somewhat tangled.

Madame De Victoria, who is thirty-three years old, is a handsome woman of the German type. She always is fashionably gowned and wears considerable jewelry. Federal authorities believe her real mission in the United States was to spread German propaganda among the Irish. She is reported to have been the chief aide to a lieutenant commander of the German navy who reached here in December 1916, and who has been working among Sinn Féin sympathizers, trying to get them to assist in the British navy in order to plant bombs on warships.

GOMPERS' ADVICE TO THE WORKERS

Ottawa, April 28.—Great importance is attached by the government to the mission to Canada of Samuel Gompers, the directing head and guiding hand of organized labor on this continent. Between the lines of his message to Canadian labor and to the Canadian people as delivered in this three Ottawa addresses, one from the seat of the prime minister in parliament, one given at the banquet tendered him by the government on Friday night, and one given before the Canadian Club of Ottawa yesterday, there runs an underlying idea. Mr. Gompers pleaded for the unity and co-operation of all classes of the community, and deprecated "Bolshevikism," with which he said a considerable part of the Socialist propaganda was permeated.

In the U. S. A., as chairman of the national defence committee, Mr. Gompers has associated with him and working in complete harmony the most prominent employers of labor, as well as the most representative labor leaders in the country. As a result of the co-operation and good understanding which has been secured there is now, as Mr. Gompers stated yesterday, less unemployment, less friction between capital and labor and fewer industrial disputes than ever before in the history of the United States.

In Canada until recently there has not been quite the same mutual confidence and co-operation between the government, and the heads of organized labor than has obtained in the United States since the outbreak of the war.

There has been, too, as Mr. Gompers intimated in the course of his address on Friday night, a growing element of extreme socialism in the ranks of organized labor and its leaders in Canada, which he believes will hamper unity of action in Canada and which is not in accordance with the real principles for which the International Federation of Labor stands.

In inner circles it is understood that one object of Mr. Gompers' visit to Canada was to use his strong, and commanding influence to see that organized labor in this country does not make the mistake of the Bolsheviks of Russia, or the I. W. O. of the Pacific coast and that a real co-operation is secured with the government and in seeing to it that "Each and all does his appointed task in getting the most effective results from all the agencies of production, transportation and distribution."

SARDINE PRICE FIXED
The price of sardines has been fixed at a minimum of \$25 per hoghead until the first day of August next. This announcement was made to The Telegraph last night during the course of an interview with E. O. Sawyer, jr., of the fish section of the Canada food board who is in the city, a guest at the Royal.

On Friday last six owners met at St. George and they decided that they would accept \$25 per hoghead as a minimum.
