London, Aug. 21—10.42 p. m.—Passengers who arrived in England today from the continent say that refugees from Brussels are camping on the beach at Ostend. Many of them had the greatest difficulty in leaving the capital, as the trains were crowded with wounded. One woman, who said she left Brussels on the last train out, declared that all the morning and afternoon before the arrival of the Germans, long processions of German wounded passed along the main road leading from the country to the Northern Railway station. She went to the station, she said, but could not find a place on board until an officer permitted her to enter the Red Cross car, which was filled with wounded soldiers.
