## DIAZ AGAIN RULER.

President of Republic Takes Office For the Eighth Term.

Mexico City, Dec. 2.—"It is very gratifying to me to say that my heart is full of faith in the progress of the people, who, like the Mexican, has known how to conquer by its own efforts a place among the lovers of toil, after having proved its valor in patriotic defence of country, and that never as to-day could I declare that Mexico belongs definitely to the group of new nations of assured stability, because against the firm guarantee of peace which we possess, no influence tending toward its dissolution can now or ever shall be able to prevail."

"As to the relations between Mexico and the United States and other friendly nations, never have they been more cordial."

The above is the authorized message of President Diaz to all nations on the day of his inauguration for the eighth time as chief executive of the Mexican nation, given expression through the medium of the Associated Press.

Peaceably and seemingly as a happy termination of the turmoil through which the nation has just passed, the ceremonies attending the taking of the oaths by General Diaz and Ramon Corral, recently re-elected President and Vice-President, were conducted yesterday.

There was no discordant note and if the occasion was shorn of brilliant features of former years by reason of recent disturbance, there was no lack of dignified ceremonial.

Notwithstanding any attempt by foes of the Diaz administration to interfere with yesterday's inauguration was remote, there was a feeling of relief apparent when the event was concluded.

There will be no change in the personnel of the Cabinet. In accordance with custom, each Minister submitted his resignation, but was asked to retain his portfolio.

King George as Arbitrator.

London, Dec. 2.—King George, as arbitrator, yesterday received the counter cases in the Alsop claims dispute between the United States and Chile, as presented to the Foreign Office last summer by U. S. Ambassador Reid and Chilean Minister Cana. It is expected that His Majesty will render his decision within a month.

The United States claims something over \$1,500,000 from Chile in satisfaction of money advanced to the Bolivian Government in 1874, in exchange for concessions in Arica. Before the agreement was fulfilled Arica passed to Chile in war. Chile subsequently agreed to assume the obligation of Bolivia to American concessionaires. The matter, however, has never been settled, and after prolonged negotiations, was submitted to the arbitration of King George.

Entertained American Officers.

London, Dec. 2.—Rear-Admiral Seaton Schroeder, commander-in-chief of the United States Atlantic fleet, Rear-Admiral Joseph B. Murdock, commander of the third division, and the officers of the American battleships, with their wives, were the guests at dinner of Ambassador and Mrs. Whitelaw Reid at Dorchester House last night.

A distinguished company of British naval officers and American residents in London were invited to meet the visitors, the guests including Admiral Sir Edward Hobart Seymour, Admiral Sir Arthur Knyvet Wilson and Sir John and Lady Lister-Kaye.

McIntosh at Kingston.

Kingston, Dec. 2.—Edward E. McIntosh, wanted in Toronto by the provincial police, was here this week. Henry O'Brien, clerk at the Randolph Hotel, says he was at the hotel on Wednesday to call for his mail. Not having been seen since, it is supposed he was given the tip that a warrant was issued for him, and skipped out. It is supposed he crossed the border. O'Brien recognized McIntosh by a cut in a paper. McIntosh did not stay at the hotel, and it is believed he was boarding at a private house. The police of the city and county are looking for him.

Trunk Victim Not Murdered.

New York, Dec. 3.—A microscopic examination of the skeleton found in a tin-lined trunk where it had lain for eight years, shows that the unidentified victim of the murder for which William Lewis, a waiter, is now sought the world over, did not die by violence. The body was yesterday identified as that of A. G. Callier, a missing artist. Commissioner Flynn of the detective bureau says that he has evidence that Lewis died several years ago of consumption, but 50,000 descriptive circulars will be sent to the police the world over.

A Hero's Death.

Norris Town Pa., Dec. 3.—In a heroic but unsuccessful attempt to save the life of Frank Hahn, aged 18 years, yesterday, Louis Rowan, assistant superintendent of the Schuylkill Valley Traction Co., was electrocuted in the company's power house here, along with the youth. Hahn was cleaning machinery and accidentally caught hold of a live wire. Rowan tried to pull the young man from the wire, but both were instantly killed.

Shearer in Winnipeg.

Winnipeg, Dec. 3.—Rev. Dr. Shearer arrived yesterday, accompanied by Dr. Grant. He would say nothing beyond that he would attend the graft enquiry commission as soon as permitted by his medical adviser.

Floods in France.

Paris, Dec. 3.—Flood conditions are again general throughout France. About 312 feet of rain fell in November and from all sections come stories of immense damage done.

Chicago Limits Skycrapers.

Chicago, Dec. 3.—Two hundred feet will be the maximum height of buildings in Chicago hereafter, a reduction of 60 feet, as at present permitted.

In the month of August this year no less than 84 steamers arrived at Prince Rupert, B.C., in September 92, and in October 84. A total of 273 steamers calling at this new port in three months is the measure of the business up to date.

The last reports from Western Canada regarding the progress of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway announce that the grading, fencing, telegraph lines and track laying has been completed on the Yorkton branch running north of Melville, the distance being 25-1-2 miles.

Track laying has also been completed into Canora, a distance of four miles from Yorkton, and the end of this extension.

On the Melville to Regina branch, a distance of 25 miles, the track laying, fencing and telegraph line has been completed to Belearos, and from that point to Regina is now under construction, also 90 miles of the branch from Regina towards the boundary are now under construction.

On the Battleford branch, a distance of 48 miles, approximately 45

per cent. of the total grading has been completed.

The grading on the Prince Albert branch, now under construction from a point west of Watrous on the main line is 85 per cent completed, and track laying has been started.

On the Calgary branch the track is laid to mile 47, and fence completed to same point. The grade north of Red Deer is now ready for track laying.

On the Melville Canora branch, reports show that the soil is very rich with no sloughs in the entire distance. The district is well settled and has every evidence of prosperity.

At Yorkton the town has already appointed a publicity commissioner, and some rapid development is looked for.

Canora has five hotels, two banks and is a busy grain shipping place. It is claimed that 1,000,000 bushels of grain were shipped from this point last year.

The house was found to be filled with a varied array of long-missing articles carefully packed in trunks and boxes. Among the others were the clothes, all dampened and ready to be ironed and put with the rest of the spoils. Every person who has missed anything in the last few months put in a claim and had their goods returned, while the thief, Hannah Sharp, pleaded guilty in court to-day and was sentenced to a three-months' term in jail on five charges.
