## All In One Coffin.

St. Bernard, Que., Oct. 4.—No blame was imputed to anybody at the coroner's inquest held yesterday on the bodies of the ten children of Alexander Gravel, who perished when their house was destroyed by fire.

Gravel, a blacksmith, testified that he twice entered his house and attempted in vain to save his children. He had his face badly burned.

By a first marriage Gravel had three children, who are still living. He had eleven children by his second wife, who died recently. Mrs. Gravel is critically ill.

The remains of the ten victims have been placed in a small coffin at the residence of their grandfather.

## Gladys Evans Released.

Dublin, Oct. 4.—The suffragette "hunger strike" brought about the release on parole from jail of another militant suffragette, Gladys Evans.

The prison doctors advised the authorities that Miss Evans' condition of health had become very grave. She will be compelled to report periodically to the authorities during the remainder of her term of five years.

## Dropped Dead In Field.

Guelph, Oct. 4.—A sudden death occurred at the House of Industry, Ferguson, yesterday afternoon, when John Atkinson, who had charge of the farm work there, dropped dead in a field near the house while binding a sheaf of corn. Mr. Atkinson was about 70 years of age and had been in the employ of the House of Industry for about fourteen years.

## Duchess at Logging Camp.

Victoria, Oct. 4.—The Duchess of Cornwall and Princess Patricia visited a logging camp thirty miles away in the mountains Wednesday and watched the men at work. At noon the Highnesses ate exactly the same fare as the loggers and professed to enjoy it hugely. Before leaving they shook hands with all.

## SHOULD ASK ROGERS.

Winnipeg Tribune Met on Trail of Minister of Interior.

Winnipeg, Oct. 4.—The Winnipeg Tribune (Ind. Liberal) yesterday said editorially:

"In the face of the protest of the Canadian nation as represented through the newspapers the Borden Government has apparently given its consent to one of the greatest 'melon cuttings' in the history of the world."

"Let the electors of Macdonald ask Mr. Rogers what stand he takes on this 'melon cutting'."

"Ask him if he thinks it right to remain silent while his colleagues in the Cabinet consent to the distribution of some \$60,000,000 to C.P.R. shareholders by this grand gift scheme in connection with the hidden assets."

"Is he a representative or a misrepresentative?"

"He should be closely questioned on the platform."

The Tribune in a front page article on the C.P.R. "melon cutting" yesterday afternoon also said:

"There seems to be scarcely a shadow of doubt that the Borden Government has, in effect, if not by official action, given its consent to the \$60,000,000 C.P.R. issue. The C.P.R. increased its stock in 1902, 1904, 1906, 1908, 1909 and 1910, and in each case it made formal application to the Dominion Government. This received authorization by an order-in-council. Prior to 1903 the C.P.R. could not issue capital stock without securing the consent of Parliament by a bill, but in that year the Government took power by statute to grant authorization by order-in-council. It is very unlikely that the company has now undertaken to reverse the procedure of the past twenty years on the strength of some legal technicality."

Want National Strike.

Lawrence, Mass., Oct. 4.—Announcement of the beginning of a campaign to bring about a possible general strike of members of the Industrial Workers of the World in this country and abroad was made here yesterday. The announcement was contained in a statement signed by Wm. D. Haywood as chairman of a joint meeting of the Editor and Giovannianni defense committee, the central committee of the local union and of the general organizers of the Industrial Workers of the World now in this city. The statement followed:

"It was agreed to extend the agitation for a general strike to be made nationwide and international if possible to take place in the event of the prisoners not being acquitted, or in the further event of the Government attempting unduly to prolong the trial. General agitation will be begun everywhere looking for this end. A proclamation will be issued containing a pronouncement of the principles of the I. W. W. adopting the general strike as the organization's weapon against government by injunction."

The ceremony took place in the assembly hall of the Macdonald Institute, which was filled with representatives of the women's institutes from all parts of the province and also of the National Council of Women, of which the late Mrs. Hoodless was one of the founders. The honor of unveiling the portrait was given to Mrs. E. D. Smith of Winona, Ont., a member of the first women's institute organized at Stony Creek, Ont.

Memorial Portrait Unveiled.

Guelph, Oct. 4.—The memory of Mrs. Adelaide Hoodless, founder of the domestic science and women's institutes in the Dominion, was honored at Macdonald Institute here yesterday afternoon, when a portrait by J. W. L. Forster of Toronto, and the gift of the Women's Institute of Ontario, was unveiled. A handsome bronze tablet was also presented, donated by the former students of the Ontario Normal School of Domestic Science and Art, and of Macdonald Institute.

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Georgetown's Successful Fair.

Georgetown, Oct. 4.—The Esquimaux Agricultural Association yesterday at Georgetown held its twenty-sixth annual exhibition, 2,500 people being on the grounds. The exhibits in the various classes were good, there being 1,500 entries. The exhibits in roots, apples, butter, cattle, poultry and horses were above the average.

The association has a balance in the bank of \$1,500 and next year the directors will have several new buildings erected on the grounds.

For the Public Good.

Washington, D.C., Oct. 4.—Addressing the special committee yesterday J. P. Morgan asserted that no contribution had ever been given by his firm or himself with the idea of securing any favors thereby. He was especially interested in the 1904 campaign, he said, solely for the welfare of the country and the people at large. That was the only interest, he said, that had guided him in making contributions to political parties.

Big Battle In Mexico.

Laredo, Texas, Oct. 4.—Mexican rebels said to have been commanded by Gen. Pascual Orozco, Jr., are reported to have been defeated in one of the most serious battles of the rebellion near Muequiz. The rebels brought ninety dead and wounded to Monterey Wednesday night.

The rebels, commanded by Gen. Blanquet, numbered 6,000. Orozco had four thousand soldiers.

Toronto Socialist Will Run.

Berlin, Oct. 4.—The Liberal executive met yesterday afternoon and decided to call a convention in the town hall at Waterloo, Oct. 9, for the purpose of nominating a candidate to contest the bye-election in North Waterloo on Oct. 23.

At a convention of Socialists held at Brimley, Ont. here last night, Matthew Weyman of Toronto, was the unanimous choice.
