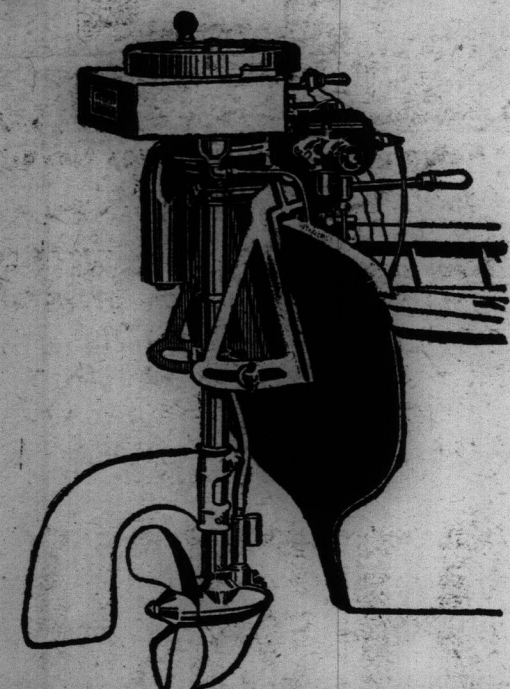

## Timber Limits

Additional applications for timber limits appear in the Royal Gazette of March 30th: Charles Cron, Hr. Grace, asks for 750 square miles, more or less, at Mak-kovick, Labrador; Mike L. Farrell, St. John's, wants only 300 miles, more or less, at Kaipokok and Mok-kovik Bay, Labrador; Wm. J. Kenny, St. John's, applies for 500 square miles at Big River, Stag Bay; Robert Dave, Bay Roberts, applies for 800 square miles, more or less, inland from White Bear Arm; Wm. Campbell, St. John's, asks for 350 miles at Kaipokok Bay; Belle Isle Straits Pulp & Lumber Co., St. John's, wants a license to cut timber on Labrador, the number of miles is not mentioned; J. W. Penney, St. John's, asks for 500 square miles, more or less, at White Bear Arm.

This is 'the people's heritage,' and as we said last week, if there is any exploiting of our timber lands to be done, and any money to be made out of them, the Government should do it in the interests of the revenue of the country, which is abnormally low at present.

Proclamation

GEORGE the FIFTH,

by the Grace of GOD, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and of the British Dominions beyond the Seas, King, Defender of the Faith, Emperor of India.

WHEREAS We deem it expedient and necessary to appoint a Term or Session for the holding of Our Supreme Court on Circuit for the Northern District of Our Island of Newfoundland, at the time and place hereinafter mentioned:

We do, therefore, by this Our Proclamation, declare to all Our loving subjects within Our said Island that it is Our will and pleasure to direct and appoint that a term or Session of Our said Supreme Court on Circuit shall be open and holden at HARBOUR GRACE, in Our said Island, on Tuesday, the Twentieth day of April next, and continue thence until Friday, the Twenty-third day of April next, both days inclusive; and, if necessary, the presiding Judge of Our said Court shall have power to extend the time thereof for two days, or for such further period as may be necessary for the conclusion of any matter or cause then in course of trial.

And of these Presents all Magistrates, the Sheriff, Officers of the Constabulary Force, Bailiffs, Constables, Keepers of Gaols and other Officers in the execution of their offices about the premises, and all and singular other persons whom these Presents do, shall, or may concern, are hereby required to take due notice and govern themselves accordingly.

Given under the Great Seal of Our said Island of Newfoundland.

Witness Our trusty and well-beloved Sir WALTER EDWARD DAVIDSON, Knight Commander of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the said Island of Newfoundland and its Dependencies, at St. John's, in Our said Island, this 16th day of March, A. D. 1915, and in the Fifth year of Our Reign.
