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MUNICIPAL AND EDUCATIONAL COMMITTEE

Your committee met at The Toiler Office on Tuesday evening last, with Delegates Cooner, Webb and Simpson present.

The recent municipal elections and the results so far obtained by our campaign for majority rule through the People's Veto and Direct Initiative will form the basis of our report.

In the election of Ald. Urquhart to the office of Mayor the right of organized labor to claim a victory is conceded, not only by individuals, but the majority of the newspapers of the city. In our endorsement of men it cannot be charged that the Toronto District Labor Council have acted merely upon sentiment, or from idle and unwarranted impulses, but with a desire to assist our cause by supporting men who were representative of the working-class.

Fraternally, to our interests, and when we speak of "our interests," it cannot be said that the deliberations of this Council have been exclusively in the interests of organized labor, for it would be difficult to find in the Dominion of Canada an equal number of men, specially organized to deal with matters coming within the scope of our actions, who do so fully and intelligently with more effectiveness the happiness and welfare of the citizens at large.

From the intricate and all-important details of our educational system, touching upon the great transportation problems of our country, and dealing with great and weighty matters affecting national policy, down to the discussion of minor local matters, all this is gathered in the subcommittee reports of the duration of our Council, and make no idle boast when we say that making due allowance for the combination of unusual circumstances that are the misfortune of our class, we consider company of men who deliberate with a fluent genius, and carry into execution set plans with an administrative ability that would add lustre even to the past record of our municipal councils.

With the exception of two of the members of our Council, the members of the District Labor Council have combined to defeat the purposes of our enemies, admitted to support with the ballot, not the bullet, the principles that have tended to emancipate the industrial classes from serfdom, chattel slavery, and wage slavery, and to obtain for them demands that labor thoroughly uniting in the political field can yield an influence destined to contribute towards the realization of the right of man to equal opportunity to life, labor and liberty, and a full return of the produce of labor to him who labors.

With two or three exceptions, the speakers upon Mr. Urquhart's platform during the campaign were from the ranks of organized labor, and the others were of the same political stripe as the unsuccessful candidate diverted him to taste, if possible, the elixir of victory under the shadow of the Lamb, and over the boasted champions of municipal ownership switched to the enemies of the principles they espoused.

The idle rumors of Liberal conspiracy or Conservative intrigue are but the harbingers that political dissolution will not be long delayed, and the opinion of opinion that will once and for all lift our municipal politics above the petty political prejudices that stultify our citizenship and pervert our consciences, and when that day dawns the laborer will longer be the hireling of any party that exists by the exploitation of his labor, but every vote will be the death-snell to political robbery and confection, and will be the olive leaf bearing the good news of the better day.

From the east and the west, came the brightest and best, and dropped in their votes by the score.

And Labor's glad shout Proclaimed: Lamb, you're out, And Howland we want you no more.

And then it was heard That C. C. was third, And Woolley was out in the cold;

But when Urquhart was in The boys raised a din, And the wanderers came back to the fold.

So boys, when you're in, Be sure you're not out, For when you're out stamping with sin now.

There's a how's-on you're track, And when you come back, You're sure to be classed among trim.

Notice to amend the constitution: See I-Art. II, to be amended by substituting the following:

This Council shall be composed of

Delegates from the following Section Councils: Trades, Unions, Labor Unions and Federal Unions. All trade or labor unions shall be represented with the international body, if such exists, or a national body, in the absence of the international, and in case of the non-existence of international or national body, then such local shall be chartered by the American Federation of Labor, or the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada, which will strike directly with their various union labels.

We desire the delegates to note the implied slur in the foregoing reference to international unions.

Another paragraph of the appeal reads as follows: "Nothing was left, therefore, to the delegates who remained true to the interests of Canadian labor but to submit to direction from international labor organizations," etc., etc.

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In another paragraph of the appeal occurs the following: "The great objection to international organizations in Canada is that strikes are fomented and carried on by labor officials from the United States, to the disadvantage of Canadian enterprise" and "Canadian labor," etc., etc.

It is only necessary for members of the international unions to stop and think what this "national body" means, to fully realize that not only do these faking mean to antagonize the present Trades and Labor Congress of Canada by inducing the Trades Councils and other bodies of a national character to affiliate with them, they also mean to disrupt the international locals of Canadian which will strike directly with their various union labels.

Your committee therefore feel that whereas this Council is chartered by the "genuine" Trades and Labor Congress of Canada and is duty-bound to protect at all times the Congress from the attacks of any "fake" organization

that may appear, and whereas the various international locals in this Council are convinced that the interests of organized labor in Canada are best served by international connection, and we feel that locals opposed to international trade unionism should not be given the prestige of being affiliated with this Council, we would therefore recommend and do hereby advise the members of this Council to, to demand the constitution of this Council as to permit only locals connected with international unions (where such exist) to be affiliated, this amendment being in accord with the amended constitution of the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada; and we believe, is necessary to advance the cause of international trade and labor organizations and all bona fide union labels.
