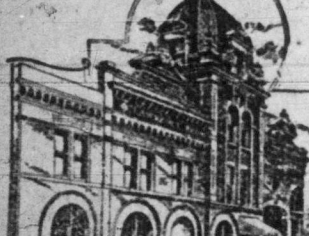

Chief Thompson says the union is not feasible, but his committee would like to tell him it is both feasible and necessary, and, as the chief says, he will have none of it on his brigade, we desire to give him his answer from organized labor to the effect that he had better keep his hands off the union or he will be hunting for another brigade before he wishes to. The firemen have a union, and they have a right to it, and if Chief Thompson interferes with a member of the brigade simply because he is a member of the union, he will be making the mistake of his life. Chief Thompson had better understand right here and now that until the union gives him cause for complaint, he must not place himself in the position of dictator, because organized labor will not tolerate it. He might just as well assume that the Masonic Order or the Oddfellows or Grandmasters were prohibitive organizations for firemen, because of their likelihood of making the fireman neglect his duty.

Your committee have two unions under way, and expect to report them as organized at the next meeting.

LABEL COMMITTEE

Your committee reported on Nov. 13th as having appointed a sub-committee to co-operate with representatives from the Carriage and Wagon Workers, the Leather Workers and the Horseshoers' Union, in appearing before the Fire and Light Committee of the City Council, to urge them to have all horse-drawn harness made and wagons repaired for the Fire Department in shops employing union labor exclusively.

The delegation appeared before the Fire and Light Committee Wednesday, Nov. 20th. Messrs. Barker and Redford represented the Horseshoers' Union, No. 19. Messrs. Thompson, Smith and Jamieson represented the Brotherhood of Leather Workers, No. 25. Messrs. Shickle and Thompson represented the Carriage and Wagon Workers' Union, and Delegates Thain and Kennedy appeared on behalf of the Label Committee.

On representatives urged the adoption of the union label on all work done for the Fire Department. Chief Thompson presented a report, showing that a portion of the harness work was given to shops employing only union men, and entitled to the label. Like conditions prevailed in giving out work to the horseshoers and wagon makers. It was also pointed out that the prevailing wage was paid in those shops (not strictly union) that were now doing a portion of the work for the department.

The point was demonstrated that the custom work for the department could be done in shops employing union labor only and entitled to use the union label of the craft, if the head of the department would only demand the label from the employers, their shops would soon become union and use the label.

Alfred Richardson and Lynd reported the contention that the label should be done in only union shops, while Alderman Hubbard appeared to be greatly worried about asking for the label on the part of the department. Mr. Richardson finally moved that Fire Chief Thompson be requested to get all the work done in union shops where possible. It remains for the near future to predict what effect our representation will have.

The appeal of the Co-operative Broom Co. of Berlin, Ont., to organized labor in this city has been considered by your committee, and we decided to send a circular letter to about twenty-five of the prominent grocers, asking them to buy "union label brooms" when the agent from Berlin broods upon them, which would be inside of a week or two days. The grocers were also informed that "Woman's Union Label League" had been organized in the city, and would demand "label" goods from the dealers.

Your committee are impressed with the necessity of protecting all bona fide union labels against the introduction of so-called union labels of the same trade as calling "label" the laborers from international unions, which has been issued by the "avertment of labor fakers" who have styled themselves as officers of a National Trades and Labor Congress of Canada, which has been formed to counteract the international trade union movement in Canada.

The Labor Bulletin of Nov. 1st, published in Quebec and posing as the official organ of this new congress (which claims to really represent the Canadian laborer), has on the above date referred to union labels as follows: "It has remained for the National Trades and Labor Congress of Canada to adopt one label for all goods that are manufactured by union labor under fair conditions. By purchasing articles with the National Label the public are supporting Canadian industry."

In the same issue of this paper they claim to be making much progress, and state that "inquiries and promises of support have come in from west and east that would not be at all pleasing to our brothers of the internationals."

In referring to the ending of the cigar-makers' strike in Montreal, the same paper says: "The great difficulty they had to contend with was to get the public to purchase union label goods. Had

MUNICIPAL AND EDUCATIONAL COMMITTEE

Your committee met at The Toller Office on Tuesday evening last, with Delegates Cooper, Webb and Simpson present.

The recent municipal elections and the results so far obtained by our campaign for majority rule through the People's Veto and Direct Initiative will form the basis for our report.

In the election of Ald. Urquhart to the mayor's chair the right of organized labor to claim a victory is conceded, not only by individuals, but the majority of the newspapers of the city. In our endorsement of men it cannot be charged that the Toronto District Labor Council have acted merely upon sentiment, or from idle and unwarmed impulses, but with a desire to assist our cause by supporting men who were friendly, and had proved themselves friendly, to our interests. And when we speak of "our interests" it cannot be said that the deliberations of this Council have been exclusively in the interests of organized labor, who deal so freely and liberally with matters so largely involving the happiness and welfare of the citizens at large. From the intricate and all-important details of our educational system, touching upon the great transportation problems of our country, and dealing with great and weighty matters affecting national policy, down to the discussion of minor local matters, all that is required to contribute towards a solution of the duties of our Council, and we make no little boast when we say that making due allowance for the combination of extraneous circumstances that attend the misfortune of our class, we can muster a company of men who deliberate with a useful genius, and carry into execution set plans with an administrative ability that would aid us to the past record of our municipal Councils.

With the exception of two of the members of our Council, the members of the district Labor Council have combined to defeat the purposes of our enemies, and united to support with the ballot, not the ballot, the principles that have tended to emancipate the industrial classes from serfdom, chattel slavery, and wage slavery, and for once we have demonstrated that labor thoroughly united in the political field can wield an influence destined to contribute towards a condition that will recognize the right of men to equal opportunity in life, labor and liberty, and a full return of the products of their labor to the producers.

With two or three exceptions, the speakers upon Mr. Urquhart's platform during the campaign were from the ranks of organized labor, and even those who were of the same political stripe as the present candidates cheered him to the top, if possible, the elixir of victory under the shadow of the Lamb, and even the boasted champions of municipal reform, envious to the enemies of the principles they espoused.

The idle rumors of Liberal conspiracies or Conservative intrigues are but the barbed darts of political dissension, which will only in the end defeat him. It is the opinion of the majority of the members of our Council, and for all that our municipal politics above the petty political prejudices that stunt our citizenship and pervert our consciences, and in our support for financial assistance we have been liberally treated, as will be seen by the following table of receipts and expenditures:

From the east and west
Came the brightest and best,
For in union there is strength, and we for
And labor's glad shout
Proclaimed: Lamb, you're out,
And Howland we want you no more.

And then it was heard
That C. C. was third,
And Woodley was out in the cold;
But when Urquhart was in
The boys raised a din,
And the wanderers came back to the fold.

So boys, when you're in,
Be sure you're not out;
For when you're out stumping with sinners,
There's boys on you're track,
And when you come back
You'll sure be classed among trimmers.

We must always unite
When out-riding the fight,
For in union there is strength to our cause;
But in divide
There's some will backslide,
And hand our arms to our foes.

But we've now had the call;
Let us work, one and all;
Success has just crowned our endeavor;
And we unite,
In the thick of the fight
Our cry will be "Victory forever!"

The strong vote in the East End, the triumph of labor, is the strong vindication of the Council's action in endorsing Ald. Urquhart for Mayor, and with the present composition of the City Council it is heartily expected that the coming year will witness a shaking-up of the old bosses and the inauguration of an aggressive policy of civic reform that
